The next Environmental Justice Advisory Board (EJAB) meeting will be held virtually on Thursday, August 19 from 1:00 to 7:00pm. The meeting will include a presentation on the draft revised EJ Policy and presentations on EJ initiatives from partners in the southcentral region of the Commonwealth.

On July 20 the White House released Interim Implementation Guidance for the Justice40 Initiative

outlined in Executive Order (EO) 14008. The Justice40 Initiative requires that Federal investments are made with a goal of 40% of overall benefits flowing to disadvantaged communities. The Interim

Guidance for the Justice 40 Initiative

Implementation Guidance issued by the White House for the Justice 40 Initiative includes an interim definition of disadvantaged communities and outlines examples of federal programs subject to the Justice40 Initiative. **Washington State Environmental Justice Laws**

Washington State recently passed two laws that focus on Environmental Justice. These laws include the <u>Healthy Environmental for All (HEAL) Act</u> and the <u>Climate Commitment Act</u>. Key components of

the (HEAL) Act include requirements to: define EJ in state law; direct funding with environmental benefits to overburdened communities; ensure tribal sovereignty and rights around EJ; advance

equitable community participation in planning, resource allocation, and enforcement; create and fund an EJ Council; require an EJ assessment; and fund and apply the Washington Environmental Health Disparities (WA-EHD) Map. The Climate Commitment Act focuses on establishing a cap and invest program that includes requirements on air quality targets and emissions control initiatives in overburdened communities. The Act requires at least 35%, with a goal of 40%, of these investments to provide direct and

Temple University Policy Proposal for a More Equitable Green Future

A Policy Brief from Temple University's Public Policy Lab focuses on the importance of addressing social and racial inequities in cities like Philadelphia in order to combat climate change. The Policy Brief, From Struggle Space to an Inclusive and Climate-Ready Philadelphia: Policy Proposals for a More Equitable Green Future, notes that climate planning and policy must prioritize equity and resident-identified needs or you run the risk of replicating and exacerbating historic racial injustices.

meaningful benefits to communities that are disproportionately burdened with environmental harms

and health impacts, and for these investments to be guided by an Environmental Justice

assessment. In addition, 10% of the investments must also go to tribal projects and programs.

The Policy Brief describes the "struggle space". The struggle space is "where daily struggles to survive resulting from histories of disinvestment and discrimination can create challenges for longterm climate planning". The authors suggest that Philadelphia and other cities can use climate planning to build a racially-just city and amend past inequities. **EPA to Hold National Environmental Justice Advisory Council Call** EPA is holding the next National Environmental Justice Advisory Council (NEJAC) public meetings on August 18 and 19, 2021. These free meetings are open to the public and are being held from

approximately 3:00-7:00pm EST each day. Registration is REQUIRED to attend either meeting. Members of the public are encouraged to provide comments relevant to the specific issues being
