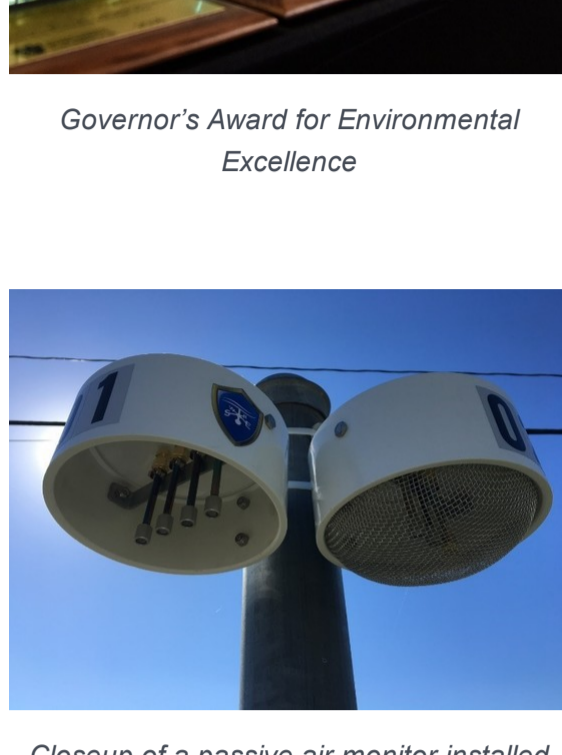

Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence Accepting Applications!

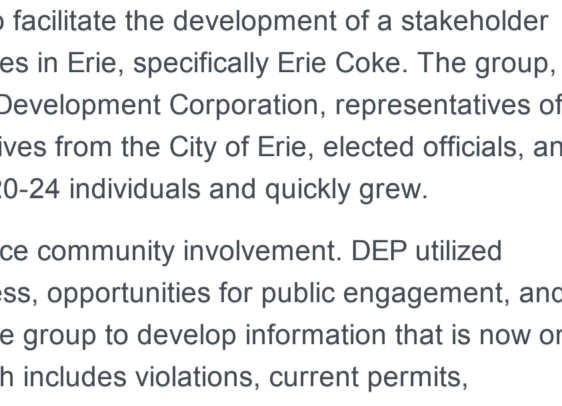

Community Involvement Inspires Erie Monitoring System

In Erie, OEJ and DEP staff have been working to advance citizen participation and involvement that sparked local air monitoring support. OEJ began discussing environmental justice (EJ) issues regarding Erie Coke in June of 2016 with EJAB member and Urban Erie CDC Executive Director Gary Horton and other stakeholders. In August of 2017, DEP received a Title V permit renewal application from Erie Coke. The renewal application sparked enhanced public participation around the permit application and Erie Coke operations. Because of the feedback from the community on Erie Coke's application, DEP began to facilitate the development of a stakeholder group interested and engaged in environmental issues in Erie, specifically Erie Coke. The group, included Gary Horton of the Urban Erie Community Development Corporation, representatives of the Benedictine Sisters, the Sierra Club, representatives from the City of Erie, elected officials, and others. The group first met in October of 2017 with 20-24 individuals and quickly grew.

DEP has utilized several engagement tools to advance community involvement. DEP utilized stakeholder meetings to explain the permitting process, opportunities for public engagement, and other work under DEP. DEP staff also worked with the group to develop information that is now on a [community information page](#) on DEP's website, which includes violations, current permits, emissions reports, summary documents, and other information pertinent to the public. Community members also expressed concern over health, so DEP facilitated other agencies coming to the table including the Agency for Substance and Toxic Disease Registry (ASTDR) and the Department of Health (DOH) to discuss specific health concerns.



Location of the 13 air monitors installed around Erie Coke.

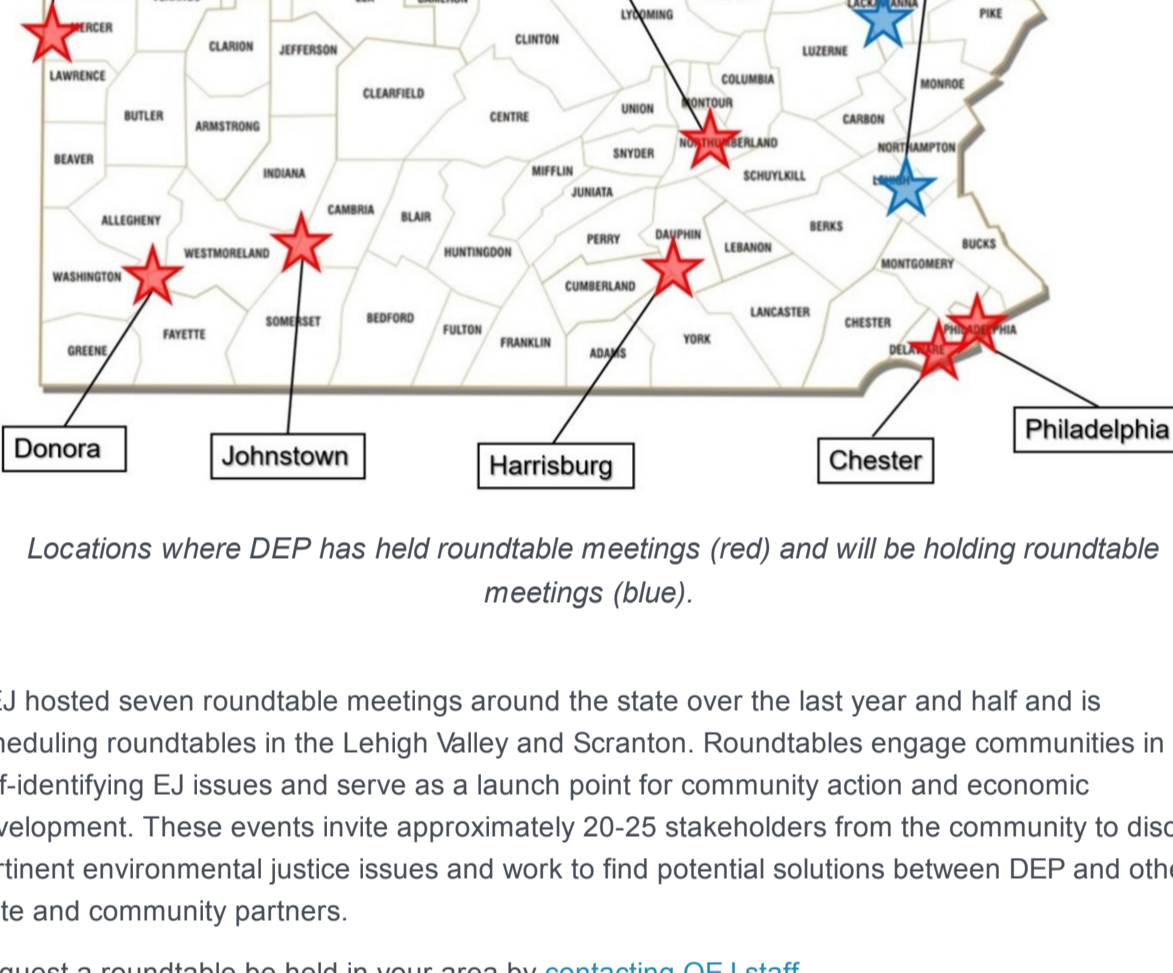
Currently, a passive sampling system has been installed that is monitoring benzene, toluene, ethyl benzene and toluene 24/7 at the facility. The system includes 13 different samplers around the Erie Coke facility. The goal is to measure the impacts from the plant on the community. The data will be analyzed by DEP, DOH, ATSDR and the public. The results of the sampling can be found on our [website](#). The website is updated approximately every two weeks to include new sampling results. DEP is working to help community residents understand the significance of the results and support communities in assessing potential health impacts.

A key lesson learned and reinforced is that it is valuable for DEP to interact early and often with the local community. DEP's formation of a stakeholder group started as a forum for expressing public concerns and led to an ongoing dialogue. The ongoing dialogue led to many outcomes that were unexpected back in 2017. OEJ is working to replicate stakeholder groups across the Commonwealth so other communities can share their environmental issues.

OEJ hosted seven roundtable meetings around the state over the last year and half and is scheduling roundtables in the Lehigh Valley and Scranton. Roundtables engage communities in self-identifying EJ issues and serve as a launch point for community action and economic development. These events invite approximately 20-25 stakeholders from the community to discuss pertinent environmental justice issues and work to find potential solutions between DEP and other state and community partners.

Seeds of Change

Rafiqqa Muhammad is a lifelong resident of Harrisburg, PA and has been a central figure in the community for years. Rafiqqa is the co-founder and artistic director of Ngozi Inc., a non-profit organization she founded 34 years ago that provides academic, physical, and cultural education and experiences to communities of color.

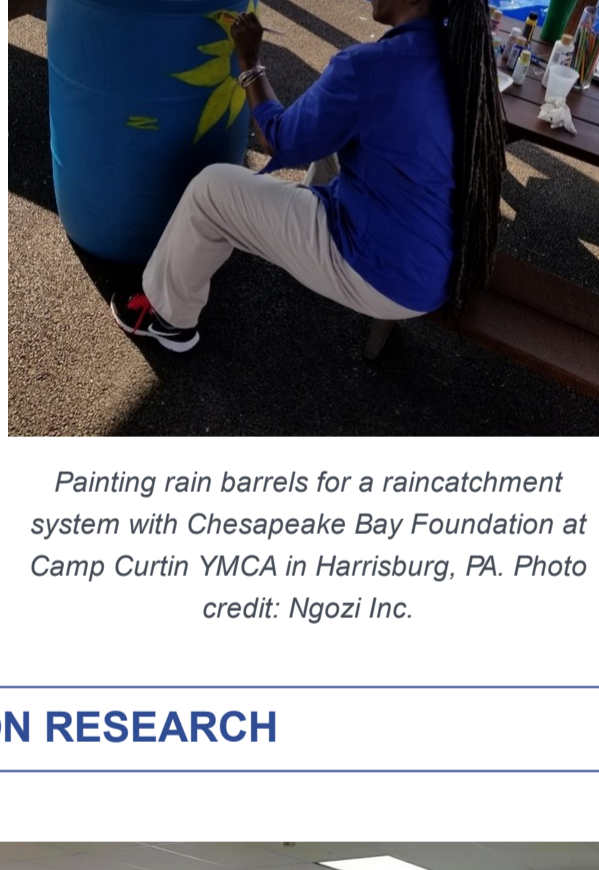
"The goal is to educate youth and their families about sustainable systems and how to live a more holistic life style," said Rafiqqa. With that vision, Ngozi Inc. has mobilized the Harrisburg community through its Let's Get Dirty! program. Let's Get Dirty! has implemented urban gardens, water catchment systems, and recycling programs at Harrisburg School District, City of Harrisburg Parks & Recreation Department, City of Harrisburg Public Works Department, The Boys & Girls Club of Harrisburg, Camp Curtin YMCA, and others.

Let's Get Dirty! has successfully certified 26 individuals in permaculture design in Dauphin, Cumberland, and Lancaster counties. Ngozi Inc., continues to focus on urban agriculture, cultural outreach and non-profit strategic planning to plant seeds of growth and environmental literacy throughout Harrisburg and disadvantaged communities.

The Benefits of Environmental Education for K-12 Students

The North American Association for Environmental Education (NAAEE) reported on a fascinating study conducted by researchers at Stanford University. The researchers reviewed 119 peer-reviewed studies completed over the past 20 years on the impacts of environmental education on K-12 students. The findings revealed that environmental education provides many benefits beyond just environmental knowledge. The studies revealed a multitude of benefits from environmental education including improved academic performance, enhanced critical thinking skills, increased civic engagement, positive environmental behaviors, developed personal growth and life-building skills including confidence, autonomy, and leadership. The review suggests that the hands-on aspect and versatility in environmental education can be tailored to various learning styles and can increase classroom participation. From the study, Dr. Nicole Ardoin of Stanford University said, "There is no doubt that environmental education is one of the most effective ways to instill a passion for learning among students." 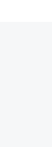
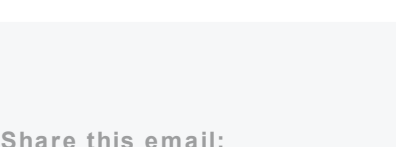
