

Act 45 of 2025 (HB 416)

Related to the Proposed Rulemaking for Administrative Amendments to 25 Pa. Code Chapters 121 and 127

Background

- The November 12, 2025, amendments to the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), known as The Fiscal Code, included a new section (Section 1805 of Article XVIII, Subarticle C) specific to air quality general permits.
- These provisions were effective immediately upon approval by the Governor.

Summary

- Subsections (a) and (b) included new provisions specific to general permits issued prior to November 12, 2025, including subsequent revisions.
- The new provisions govern how applications for authorization to use air quality general permits are reviewed, the timelines involved, and under what circumstances applications are approved or denied.

Provisions

- DEP is required to notify the applicant of any deficiencies within 20 days of submission of the application.
- The applicant is required to address each deficiency within 25 days of submission of the application.
- If the applicant does not address each deficiency within the timeframe, DEP is required to deny the application.

Provisions

- DEP is required to review the application within 30 days of submission. The 30 days may be extended one time by an additional five days with consent of the applicant.
- If DEP fails to issue a determination within this timeframe, the applicant may proceed under the provisions of the general permit.

Key Points

- If a deficiency response is late, DEP is **required** to deny the application.
- There is no provision to “stop the clock.”
- This is the first time that air quality permitting has a “deemed approved” requirement.

Next Steps

- DEP is looking into what changes may need to be made.
 - Regulatory
 - General Permit forms
 - IT systems
- DEP intends to incorporate the applicable statutory requirements into Chapter 127, Subchapter H. These revisions will be added to the Chapters 121/127 proposed rulemaking and are scheduled to be presented to AQTAC at the May 2026 meeting.
