2. Comment

10. Comment

This Sunoco pipeline going through the heart of Exton, past a library and mall and shopping center, into and through the Marchwood subdivision, past several schools, homes and apartment complexes, near a YMCA and daycare centers, through the

Eagle Corporate Center where people live, work and enjoy restaurants, near a gym and daycare centers is a travesty!

Instead of choosing a safer venue for everyone and putting the pipes in deep and with human safety key, Sunoco has done the very worst and DEP has signed off on this abomination. Please review carefully and change your ruling for the sake of many many lives. You don't want the lives of many on your hands due to negligent behavior for big oil! (10)

11. Comment

Please consider an alternative route for the pipeline. We need to think about the loss of mature trees and wetlands, the threat to the library, businesses, and most importantly the homes with FAMILIES that are located near this route. (11)

12. Comment

I am appalled that Sunoco and its partner companies are planning to route the Mariner East 2 pipeline through downtown Exton putting thousands of people at risk on a daily basis. This proposed route passes dangerously close to the most heavily used library in Chester County and the Exton Mall. It eliminates some of the few wetlands left in the area.

This pipeline is not a public utility, but a for profit cooperation seeking to make money selling highly volatile gas liquids to Europe for the purpose of making plastics.

Please consider the safety of the thousands of people affected by this decision. Or are the citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania merely the sacrificial lambs on the high altar of corporate greed? (12)

13. Comment

I am writing to express my concerns with the change from HDD to open cut for the Mariner East 2 pipeline in the area of Swedesford Rd in Exton. I live less than a mile from this area in Uwchlan and have public water through Aqua.

I have concerns for many reasons of safety in a highly populated area with businesses and residences in this area due to the fact an open cut will now have a more shallow depth for the high pressure piping which exposes a much higher risk if there was an incident in an area where there are local little league fields, homes, wells, our public library and wetland area. I am very familiar with the wetland area close to the library and for open cut to happen they would need to clear trees and native wetland area to go through this area, not to mention this is a building where children frequent.

My biggest concern is the close proximity to Aqua's well for public water. There has already been incidents by Shoen Rd with private wells, but this is a much larger impact if something were to happen to our water source. It makes more sense to suggest Sunoco relocate the pipeline North of Ship Rd through open fields away from

houses, businesses, water sources and could be buried deeper in this area as well. Please consider our concerns for our community. (13)

14. Comment

I grew up and my family still lives in this area, and I am horrified to know that Mariner East 2 pipeline is in action. I'm even more appalled that Sunoco claims this route "avoids and minimizes new and permanent impacts on previously undisturbed land, land use encumbrance, and site-specific and cumulative impacts on land, environmental, and community resources."

This is entirely UNTRUE. The area is full of people, communities: residential and commercial and resources. To do this would critically risk the entire community. The risks are entirely too great to consider such an endeavor. (14)

15. Comment

As someone who frequents the area proposed for the pipeline through Exton, it makes absolutely no sense to me why Sunoco is suggesting that this route is their best choice.

Consider the number of people who visit the proposed area on a daily basis. The pipeline would run right next to the Chester County Library District Center, which probably has the larger share of the 570K visitors and 56K library program attendees annually between it and the other location in their annual report

Next to the library is the bus stop where several bus routes deliver and pick up visitors to the Exton Square Mall. The mall itself houses Main Line HealthCare Exton Square, a large collection of medical practices and offices, in addition to other businesses. The mall's owner states that the average daily traffic around the mall is over 100K

Consider the quality of life for the residents of the area. The proposed route appears to go through Meadowbrook Manor Park, which is the home of Exton Little League baseball as well as a playground and tennis courts. It goes through or near the yards of at least 50 homes just in the immediate area. Beyond just the disruption and

contamination caused by the construction of the pipeline, the residents will have to live in constant anxiety about what will happen when the pipeline breaks in close proximity to their houses.

Local businesses, their customers, and local residents should not be burdened with the disaster that the Mariner East 2 pipeline is destined to be. Sunoco must find an alternative that does not put so many people and livelihoods at risk. It may cost them more to do so, but they are the ones who are profiting from this so they are the ones who should have to pay more to protect the people and the environment that they are imposing upon. I urge you to reject their latest proposal

- 3. The health and safety threat to the residents of our state who utilize their homes, the Chester County Library, Exton commerce and shopping district, Little League Fields, hiking trails, dog park, nature preserve and offices that are located within a few hundred feet of their proposed pipeline path.
- 4. The negative economic impact that this pipeline will have on the businesses in the area. The general public will be far less likely to frequent and commit to doing business in the area where there is a potential for health and safety risks as well as potential for loss of life due to a pipeline failure.
- 5. ETP / Sunoco's lack of consideration for alternative pipeline routes is disturbing, alarming and a hazard to the public at large who will be commuting, working and in general living their lives in a potential deadly blast zone.

In addition to my concerns specific to ETP's filing yesterday to the DEP, I have the following concerns in regards to the pipeline location throughout Chester + Delaware Counties and the state as a whole:

- 1. The location of the pipeline in general is violating numerous local set back ordinances with regards to homes, buildings, business etc. in addition to various other local twp. municipal ordinances that have been put in place to protect the residents in our state.
- a. Relative to my personal home, it is violating my Homeowner's Association's 40% open space township required ordinance and 75 foot setback ordinance. It will also handcuff me as a private land owner from being able to construct, install, add anything to the back of my home or in my personal yard without violating my township's ordinance Sunoco is enacting a de facto taking of my private property.
- 2. The location of the pipeline runs within feet of a number of school, day cares, elderly communities and in general, a great population of Pennsylvanians who will never be 100% prepared for a pipeline leak or explosion because that is an impossible occurrence to be fully prepared for. The potential for a great loss of life is higher as a result of this pipeline installation and that is the saddest fact with regard to this project. It is an unnecessary, potential devastating harm to our communities.
- 3. The below quote is from the CFO of ETP please explain to me how this project falls under the definition of a public utility for the residents of PA:
- "A public utility is a business that furnishes an everyday necessity to the public at large"

Chief Financial Officer Tom Long, of ETP:

"Once we get it in service, we couldn't be more excited about the returns," he said in answer to a question. "There is a tremendous amount of barrels that are there now and

are going to be there in the future, and they are looking for a home. But we've got to get the project completed. We think Marcus Hook will be the best export, the largest in the country over the next two or three years. I am a resident of Exton since 2004. I believe this is a great place to have a home, work and enjoy life. Exton should not be in the path of this pipeline.

Recently there has been a lot of development in Exton, we are already losing much of our landscape. This pipeline will cause the demolition of trees that have been here longer than most of the residents of Exton. This damage to the environment should be considered part of the reason the pipeline path should be changed.

Also just as important as trees is the wetlands. The wetlands are important for the ecosystem. This should be a protected area and never considered to be part of this plan to destroy it in order to place this pipeline. How would this damage affect water runoff from rain and also our drinking water?

62. Comment

It is understood from the proposed plan, that Sunoco is planning to do blasting and trenching in crowded commercial/residential areas for the pipe lines.

It is very risky and cause lot of hardship and damage to the people at large in case of any unexpected damage happen to the pipelines. Hence as residents of Exton, we strongly object to the proposed layout and request DEP to advise Sunoco to go to alternative proposal to lay the pipelines through countryside where barren lands available and the population is thin and not many commercial/residents reside. (61)

- 1. ME 2 if not stopped, will be carrying highly volatile gases through a densely populated area. It will put thousands of lives at risk of death, if there is a leak. A leak can be ignited by something as minor as a car starting or a cellphone discharge. Once ignited, it tracks back to the source of the leak causing a potential devastating explosion. A pipeline carrying similar materials exploded near Follansbee, WV (south of Pittsburgh) in 2015, just 13 months after the pipeline was installed. The clouds of odorless gas exploded into a massive fireball and burned for 24 hours, wiping out 5 acres of cornfields. Thankfully this was in a rural area, and no one was injured. It's not likely to be the case if a leak occurs in Delaware or Chester county. Near this proposed pipeline, we have schools, libraries, hospitals, malls, city streets, and developments.
- 2. There needs to be an independent Risk Assessment (Not Sunoco) regarding the Blast Radius before any permits for this area are given.
- 3. This Pipeline will pass through Sunrise Senior Living Property. It would be impossible to evacuate this facility in time after a leak.
- 4. This Pipeline will make the Library, Exton Mall, and surrounding shopping and residential areas a dangerous place.
- 5. This Pipeline will bring property values down because people do not want to live and raise their families in a Blast Zone. There is also no benefit of the pipeline to the very people who are being forced to assume the risk of living, working or shopping near it.
- 6. Construction will destroy trees and wetlands in the center of Exton. Wetlands act as water purification, flood protection, and water recharge. A Damage Assessment needs to be done by Army Corps of Engineers EPA's section 404 Enforcement needs to do Field Research and damage assessments including storm water management. An EPA study needs to be made of the 3 streams that will be affected in the construction area.
- 7. There has already been many problems caused by the drilling of this pipeline. It certainly does not inspire confidence that the project is well-run and that there won't be any leaks.
- 8. Traffic assessments must be made to report how it will be effected by construction under Rt 100
- 9. There is no plan to safely evacuate anyone in the vicinity of a leak. If you are within 1000 feet of a significant leak and it ignites, you will be engulfed in a fireball from which no evacuation is possible. In principle, everyone within a radius of about 3 miles of a leak is supposed to "self-evacuate". In Delaware and Chester counties, that means tens of thousands of people, including entire towns. The recommended

procedure is to walk upwind and away from the pipeline. How well is that likely to work? (62)

64. Comment

I live in Exton Station and I have some serious concerns about the pipeline project. We already have to deal with the issue of having them working in our backyard (I mean this literally, I'm on one of the streets where they are behind our house) and the flood lights they leave on all them time making it hard to sleep at night. The noise isn't terrible most of the time but when there is a noise it sounds like an explosion and it shakes the house. It usually also causes the lights to flicker and other electronics reset.

Sunoco kept saying how minimal the impact would be, that we would barely notice. Well we notice. Now I hear they are asking for permission to change their plans and impact even more people, take down more trees and impact the areas where most of us shop. I urge you to drive on Ship Road between Boot Road and Route 30 before you even consider this. Go slow, they have caused numerous potholes that they do such a poor job of patching that it's like one of your tires hit a speed bump.

As a resident of Chester County, I am strongly opposed to the proposed construction of the Mariner East 2 pipeline through Exton, PA. Aside from the disruption and destruction caused by its installation, the pipeline would carry highly volatile gases through a densely populated area, putting thousands of residents, businesses, and school children at risk of death if there is a leak.

We need and deserve an independent risk assessment--NOT Sunoco's own, biased analysis--regarding the blast radius before any permits are issued.

The pipeline is routed to pass through the properties of the Exton Library, Exton Square Mall, Sunrise Senior Living, Giant supermarket shopping center, and surrounding office parks and residential areas. There are no plans for evacuations in the event of a leak--and no realistic hope of evacuation for those in the immediate blast zone in the event of an explosion.

Whether the pipeline is trenched or built using a horizontal directional drill, the pipeline's construction through the center of Exton will destroy ancient, old-growth sycamores and other trees, as well as critical wetlands that provide water purification, flood protection, animal habitat, and water recharge.

The pipeline is a risk to our clean air and water and will bring property values down because people do not want to live, work, shop, or raise their families in a blast zone. In Uwchlan and West Whiteland townships, private wells have been fouled by the pipelines construction. Drilling fluids have leaked into streams and Marsh Creek Lake.

No damage assessments or storm water management analyses have been performed by the EPA or Army Corps of Engineers. No study has been made of how construction will affect the three or more streams in the direct construction area, nor of secondary impact. At a very minimum, we require these independent assessments before any work may begin. Thank you. (65)

80. Comment

Sunoco originally planned to put the Dragonpipe (Mariner East 2 pipeline) under much of the Exton area by drilling. According to its new plans, however, it wants to run the pipeline through the heart of Exton mostly by trenching.

This is a terrible proposal. Full details are in a report that Sunoco submitted to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). In the report, Sunoco claims this route "avoids and minimizes new and permanent impacts on previously undisturbed land, land use encumbrance, and site-specific and cumulative impacts on land, environmental, and community resources."

In fact, this plan does the opposite. As it passes the library, this approach destroys many of the remaining old-growth trees and much of the only significant remaining wetland in the center of Exton. And it runs right through the heart of downtown Exton, alongside the library and two major shopping malls, creating a massive, unnecessary danger to hundreds of people every day.

Sunoco failed to consider alternative routes. Sunoco filed the report with the DEP as the result of an agreement the company signed in August with the Clean Air Council and two other environmental groups. By the terms of that agreement, Sunoco is required to "...propose modification of the design of the HDD or relocation of the pipeline..."

But Sunoco has not met that requirement. It has not seriously considered relocation. Instead of insisting on routing the pipeline through the center of Exton, why didn't Sunoco consider a route through rural countryside a quarter of a mile to the north, on the other side of Ship Road? The damage to the environment would be far less, and the risks in the event of a leak would be dramatically smaller. But neither this nor any other alternative route was even considered.

The only reason the report gives for sticking to this route is that the company "routed the Project to be co-located with existing pipeline and other utility corridors to avoid new 'greenfield' routing alignments, to the maximum extent practicable." That was already a weak argument when the pipeline was to be located far underground; but now that Sunoco is proposing to locate it near the surface, it is disastrous. This plan must be stopped.

It is unconscionable to me that the DEP would not intervene on behalf of the public. This plan is hazardous to human life, the environment, and the good faith that the people of the US put into their elected representatives.

It is an extreme safety hazard, too. Please deny Sunoco's request to allow open trenching in the vicinity of the Exton Square Mall. This pipeline is just too dangerous to be located so close to so many people.

Please say no to Sunoco! (94)

96. Comment

After reviewing the latest plan to run the pipeline through heavily populated areas of Exton, I have to express my concern. The pipeline should not be running through such highly populated areas. A leak of this odorless gas is highly flammable and this track puts many people in the blast zone. Sunoco's safety record should have been a red flag before this was ever approved to go through these heavily populated areas, aside from the harm it is doing to the environment and wildlife being displaced. And the fact that this product is for export further shows that only Sunoco benefits from this and the costs to the local communities are huge. (95)

97. Comment

I am writing to you to express my concerns with the new plan for Sunoco to open trench from the Mariner East 2 Pipeline Project. We have already lost too many trees for this project. We need to protect our wetlands as well. Open trenching in these vulnerable areas is unwise, and will result in irrevocable damage to our land. Sunoco has failed to consider alternative routes, as required in their reports. We need you (DEP) to protect our environment. By granting permits for trenching, you are granting this for profit company rights to destroy our land, our water and our air. They have proven themselves to be reckless in ALL areas of this project. (96)

98. Comment

As a resident of Exton for the past 15+ years, I would like to express my deep and extreme concern over Sunoco's pipeline. Their actions and negligence thus far, as well as disregard for our residents' safety, property and environment give me little confidence that citizens of West Whiteland Township will be given any consideration. I am strongly opposed to the pipeline plans for West Whiteland Township.

As part of the project, Sunoco's new plan would stretch past the Giant and Target, through a baseball outfield, close to the senior center, through backyards, and within feet of Exton Mall and the Chester County Library. My home is in Meadowbrook Manor, which is just behind the library and ballfield, right off of Swedesford Rd., and I have a section of the impacted stream directly beside my property. While I understand the new plan is a result of very valid concern from Aqua about the water supply, I am not in favor of this new plan, at all.

This trench would cut through the epicenter of our town, and I have no faith in Sunoco's ability to execute this plan without doing further harm to property and the environment. They are hostile toward residents and continue to downplay mistakes. Not to mention the environmental impact of cutting down very old trees and vegetation.

I am open to additional dialogue on this matter if you would like to contact me. Thank you for taking my comments. (97)

99. Comment

The proposed trenching for the Mariner East 2 pipeline in Exton, PA must not be allowed. Sunoco has shown an inability to be truthful about the consequences of their construction, and the damage to the environment along the path of the pipeline would be tremendous and irreversible. Good morning. My name is Nathan Reiser. I reside in West Whiteland Township at 105 Shoen Rd, Exton PA 19341. I am adamantly against the pipeline Sunoco is looking to construct directly through our property. After hitting the aquifer back in July we have had water flowing under our property ever since and has been seen as a new spring leaking out onto Shoen Rd ever since. My concern is that sink holes, like the one that opened up on 11/11/17 in the back yards of a neighborhood off Ship Rd will become the norm for this drilling project putting me and my entire family in serious jeopardy of personal injury. My property boundary lies within 450 feet of the proposed Mariner East 2 pipeline / Chester County Library area in West Whiteland Twp Chester County

Comments on Mariner East Two Altered Construction Plan to switch from HDD to trench installation and Its Impact on Meadowbrook Manor Neighborhood and adjacent floodway/wetland

1. How does the more shallow installation of these two pipes increase the chance of a pipe breach?

It is our understanding that a pipeline breach and a release of the volatile fluids that these pipes carry will cause extreme property damage and loss of life. Forty feet downs seems a whole lot safer than 4 feet down.

2. How is construction going to impact our neighborhood?

The small dead end road at the intersection of Hillside and Winding Way is marked as a construction entrance on Sunoco's maps. Do they intend to open that road up and use Hillside Road as a construction entrance? Will trucks be parked along Hillside and Winding Way? (Mail is not delivered to mailboxes blocked by vehicles.)

3. The new plan calls for damming and redirection of streams. They will cross through the FEMA floodway and wetland next to the Chester County Library in Exton.

How does this impact the flood control in our neighborhood? Will waterway volume be lowered or increased by their work? How does this impact stormwater management? How will this impact the abundant wildlife in this wetland? How extensive will the vegetative disturbance be? Old growth trees will be cut down. How will this impact migratory birds? Do we have confidence in their restoration abilities? Will the installation cause ecological pollution? This area currently supports geese, ducks, blue herons, white herons, eagles, hawks, kingfishers, fox, snapping turtles, fish, beaver, muskrats, osprey. I have an extensive photo collection documenting the wildlife and vegetation in the pond and wetlands adjacent to the Chester County Library. And I will be documenting the effect on any pipeline construction in this area and its impact to this sensitive and rare area in West Whiteland Township.

- 4. We do not have confidence in their ability--due to Sunoco's current problems with IRs (inadvertent returns) and sinkholes--to carry out the construction in a way that will maintain our quality of life and property values. Will they restore greenways to their original state? Will they guarantee the quality of our drinking water?
- 5. Sunoco has failed to consider an alternative path for the pipeline through a less congested area.
- 6. Existing Mariner East One What product is currently being transported in the existing Mariner East One? What will happen if that pipe is breached?

- 7. Are local businesses and library fully aware of the ramifications of this altered plan?
- 8. Has Sunoco notified the Department of Environmental Protection Chief of Waterways and Wetlands, John Hohenstein, of their plans to cross streams and wetlands in this area next to the Chester County Library?
- 9. Sunoco wants to build a flare stack. If they get permission where will that be located?

This pipeline is a disaster in the making. This dangerous pipeline has no business going through the heart of Exton, just a few feet underground and right alongside our library, shopping and homes. It is your responsibility to stop it before there is a major catastrophe. (106)

108. Comment

It is outrageous to me that the DEP would even consider Sunoco's request to be permitted to route the Mariner East 2 pipelines directly through Exton by open trenching. The agreement reached this past August with the Environmental Hearing Board proposed that Sunoco modify their HDD method to prevent further damage to local water sources or relocate the pipeline. Instead Sunoco wants to use trenching through the most congested part of central downtown Exton close to the busy library and two major shopping centers. This would create not only massive congestion problems but unnecessary risks to thousands of people in the area if the pipeline should rupture.

Sunoco's rationale for this route is totally unacceptable since it will result in the most disturbance and risks to the residents and customers in this area. They have not provided any valid rationale for not relocating the pipeline to a nearby less congested route which would result in far less damage to our environment and expose far fewer residents to the risks from pipeline leaks or ruptures.

For these reasons I urge you to disapprove Sunoco requests to trench through central Exton.' (107)

109. Comment

I'm writing with great concern regard the mariner easy pipeline project that is under construction through Exton, Pa. As this project progresses it seems as though Sunoco was not as forthcoming regarding this project. Numerous safety concerns are arising regarding drilling, sink holes, safety of drilling mud and contaminated water. Over-site of the project has come into question and ongoing I have great concern for my family's safety if a leak should occur. In light of the construction issues I am deathly afraid of the maintenance issues. My property and business are both situated on the pipeline construction and blast zone route and I question why would this project be approved through such a populated area. The disruption and future safety to Pennsylvania's along this route seems too high of a price for a company to sell

goods to foreign entities. This is a private for profit enterprise that is potentially dangerous to the surrounding communities. Please stop this project. (108)

110. Comment

Please help my community stop the Mariner 2 pipeline from destroying yet another piece of Chester County landscape. I am unlucky enough to have the pipeline running directly through my backyard due to an easement signed by the previous owners of my home- which was not disclosed. Please, listen to those of us who now have to live with this horror for the rest of our lives. Please stop them. Make them find an alternate route. Make them use alternate resources that are cleaner and more environmental friendly. STOP THEM. PLEASE.

My community will not be silenced or ignored. We will continue to fight and speak our minds. We are not going away. Please do what you were elected to do and KEEP MY COMMUNITY SAFE. (109)

111. Comment

Hello, it is extremely upsetting to see that my house will now be in a "blast zone". I have 2 young children and the neighborhood is full of other young children. I would love to hear your thoughts, as well as the thoughts of Sunoco board members, president, vice president, etc., if your house was in the "blast zone". Please help us prevent this from happening. (110)

112. Comment

I am writing to express my concern, dread, disbelief. fill in any other word about the Mariner East 2.

I live in West Goshen, PA, and drive past the construction of this pipeline often, from Gradyville to Exton. I am appalled that this construction is being allowed so close to major residential areas. What are you thinking? Who is allowing this to happen? Who has been paid off to look the other way?

I have read quite a bit about well contamination. I have a well, and am deeply concerned that my well, as well as others' will be contaminated. I am fearful of a mishap that might cause an explosion. This pipeline is so close to people's homes, in many cases, the silver wall being constructed is right next to children's swing sets. What kind of message are you sending? That the average citizen does not matter, when it comes to oil companies?

Please force Sunoco to choose an alternate route, far from major residential areas. I understand that Sunoco has not filed an alternate route, and are not being required to do so.

How many of you, that are making these decisions, live in Mariner East 2's path? I am guessing none. (111)

113. Comment

Thank you for the opportunity to share my Comments on this DEP permit modification. I am a resident who lives in Exton. I take my children to the Chester County Public Library on a regular basis and our church, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, where we spend a significant amount of time is just down the street.

- 1. Having a large diameter pipe carrying colorless, odorless, heavier than air liquid ethane, butane and propane under pressures of 1500 psi with 5 times the explosive energy of an equivalent, more common, natural gas line just 10 feet from the public library, going under little league fields, through resident's yards and past a tremendous number of workplaces just 3 feet underground is just plain irresponsible from an environmental and public safety perspective.
- 2. The reason for this permit modifications, as stated in the report is "Aqua America (Aqua), the local water authority, contacted Sunoco Pipeline, L.P. (SPLP) regarding their Hillside Drive production well along Swedesford Road and inquired on potential negative effects to this public water supply well that could result from implementation of the HDDs as planned." With that said, if construction alone could impact the public water supply, how would a potential leak of one of these pipes impact the public water supply? Liquid ethane, butane and propane pose an extensive risk to drinking water and if there is even a small leak that releases into the groundwater, would our public water supply also be impacted? Clearly, if the simple construction of this pipe so close to our public wells is a threat, the presence of the contents of the pipe is a threat to the public water supply as well.
- 3. Once trees and wetlands are gone they cannot be replaced and we all know that they are important, not just for their beauty but more importantly for their relationship to stormwater management and runoff issues in highly populated areas.
- 4. Construction and digging operations in close proximity to the general population, especially in Chester County, are dangerous to the health and safety of our children. See screenshot of mother's account of local baby with botulism, attributed to open cut construction of THIS pipeline in the neighborhood where she lives. Do you know

how many mothers with small babies visit Chester County Library daily with their children?

5. Why didn't they consider other routes? They are required to address that in the report by the agreement they signed with Clean Air Council et al., but they just said "oh, it's less disruptive if we put it in where there are pipes already". No serious consideration of other locations--and there are far better options (both from a safety and wetlands perspective) on either side of Exton.

114. Comment

I live in West Goshen Township, Chester County, PA and the blatant disregard by the Mariner East project for public health, property, water, farms, air quality, wetlands, lives of citizens and creatures alike is disgusting. I know pm2.5 particles and the air quality issues related to this project is real. I have a letter from Children's Hospital of Philadelphia saying that my kids cannot attend Saints Peter and Paul School on Boot Road in East Goshen, PA due to air quality from the HDD drilling and required street sweeping as it relates to triggering asthma, allergies and immunology conditions.

Why are our lives and property not being taken into consideration? Your mission is to Protect Pennsylvania's air, land and water from Pollution and to provide for the health and safety of its citizens through a cleaner environment. This Sunoco/ETP pipeline is in direct conflict of your mission. I think you need to be reminded of this.

Middletown school district has the same issues. If this project were safe, I would not be holding in my hand and disseminating my Asthma, Allergy and Immunology Doctors note from CHOP saying my children cannot be near these sites and cannot attend school near these sites. So what are you going to do about it? Right now, in my mind you are a disgrace of a hypocritical organization. Prove me wrong. Don't allow Sunoco to resume drilling.

The DEP is not doing its job at all. What is the sheen on the drilling mud returns? We have pictures. We have pictures of the Bara Kade and Super Gel X they use for drilling and it specifically says on the packaging under regulatory information – Very Toxic. And in 1997 the IARC International Agency for Research on Cancer concluded that the crystallines inhaled can cause lung cancer in humans. That's not natural and mixed in with these inadvertent mud returns (frac outs). What will this do to our children in twenty years? Will they all have lung cancer, never having smoked? If I accepted a project at work that was in direct conflict of my mission, I would be fired. (113)

115. Comment

I wanted to chime in that I find it very regrettable we put the interests of a large corporation before our citizens. This pipeline is NOT for natural gas but for Natural

Gas Liquids like ethane, propane, and butane. As such, it is a hazardous liquids pipeline. The bulk of the product, a potential of over 500,000 barrels a day, is for export. It will not run our cars, nor heat our homes, or even power industry. It will create few local permanent jobs. Yet somehow, we feel the interests of the stock holders comes ahead of our aquifers, safe drinking water, and natural wetlands. We take all the risks, and share in no benefits. Where is the upside for the community?

While safety may not be the purview of the DEP, but rather that of the anemic DOT's PHMSA. The disregard for public safety is reprehensible. While pipelines may be safer than transport by train, or truck, they do facilitate the possibility of disaster on a much larger scale. This transmission pipeline project, with a capability of half a million barrels of ethane a day, will run through heavy populated areas within feet of homes, schools, parks, and under swing sets and trampolines. You read stories of pipeline failures, invariably in farmers' fields, where fires rage and homes 1,000 feet away are damaged. This pipeline will run through a narrow 50' wide corridor alongside two 80 year old pipelines. Failure in one will surely cascade since no safety measures such as double walled pipes or blast protection are to be used to protect adjacent pipes. When a pipeline such as this fails in a "High Consequence Area" as PHMSA puts it, the consequences can only be high. I hope those who were cavalier in putting this through backyards face negligent homicide charges in the event of any failure resulting in death. Failure is only an accident when all reasonable safety precautions are taken. Sadly the Sunoco actuaries have determined that in the event of a disaster, my life, your life, and those of our neighbors are cheaper than building fault tolerant and safe infrastructure. (114)

116. Comment

I am a resident of Exton at 302 Exton Lane. I was approached by a third party employee contracted by Sunoco several months ago.

The employee informed us of Sunoco's plan to construct a new pipeline through Exton. I was shocked that this was the first time I ever heard of such a plan. How could a pipeline be constructed on our block and we were never informed of it? She asked me if I would be interested in having my water tested prior to the construction.

She was not able to provide any details on the pipeline construction. It wasn't until I did my on research that I discovered the deleterious environmental effects of Sunoco's pipeline construction. How can such a pipeline be approved when trees and wetland will be destroyed in the process? Not to mention this pipeline will be running through the center of downtown Exton with 2 major shopping malls as well as a library its proximity.

Has Sunoco considered any alternative route that is less dangerous to both people and environment? Should a leak or unanticipated events occur, it would wreak unfathomable havoc.

The most disturbing aspect regarding this is the fact that hardly anyone in Exton is aware of this pipeline. How can this be approved without the residents' voice or vote? (115)

I am a resident with 2 small children and pets about 10 minutes away from exton mall- We have a water well that provides my family with clean water to date. I am also a physician who works in the community and keenly aware of how our environment impacts patient health. I am advocating for my patients and my family. Sunoco is proposing to change the pipe installation method that was proposed in a public meeting in the summer. I know this because I received via the USPS a multipage printed information packet. You were clearly listed you as the email contact. I have listed several comments and 22 specific questions.

It is my understanding that a pipeline breach and a release of the volatile fluids that these pipes carry will cause extreme property damage and loss of life. Forty feet downs seems a whole lot safer than 4 feet down. This line passes through the heart of a very busy section of Exton.

The new plan calls for damming and redirection of streams. They will cross through the FEMA floodway and wetland next to the Chester County Library in Exton.

I have a serious of questions:

- 2. Will waterway volume be lowered or increased by their work?

- 9. How extensive will the vegetative disturbance be?
- 10.Old growth trees will be cut down. How will this impact migratory birds?

I can document that this area currently supports geese, ducks, blue herons, white herons, eagles, hawks, kingfishers, fox, snapping turtles, fish, beaver, muskrats, osprey. We are told they will be damming up the creek while digging the pipeline trenches. What about water quality and potential for flooding?

- 4) Sunoco may plan to cut down several if not all mature trees next to our property.

Where the pipeline has already gone in, there are reports of unexpected sinkholes, contaminated water / wells, and the extreme disruption of long-term construction, all for a private company's project that offers no benefit to the communities it affects.

Sunoco should, at the very least, be required to study alternative routes and pick the least impactful one, rather than go straight through a neighborhood, past a hospital and library, and through a long-established wetland. The current route has already been rejected twice by recommendation of Aqua Pennsylvania; our community agrees vehemently that it is not enough to simply bring that harm up to the surface.

It has recently come to my attention that Sunoco Logistics (Logistics) wants to build its Mariner 2 pipeline through the business heart of Exton PA via open cut trenching instead of horizontal directional drilling (HDD). I live in West Whiteland Township along the pipeline route and go through the central Exton area for multiple activities. The trenching will complicate those activities and effect adversely the businesses in that area.

I bring to your attention two other items regarding Logistics' pipeline building that, for me at least, bring its credibility into doubt. First, the expanded pipeline will be built through a property easement that my Home Owners' Association negotiated with Logistics. Integral to the agreement made, as I understand it, was Logistics' undertaking to construct its new pipeline(s) using HDD, rather than trenching. It is a matter of concern to me that Logistics now proposes to trench rather than HDD another part of the pipeline path. I am concerned that Logistics will have a similar change of approach when it comes to that portion of the pipeline which abuts my community. That is, that Logistics will seek to abandon HDD for trenching, with greater noise and surface disruption, at the very least, when it actually comes to building its pipeline through my area.

Second, I attended several community meetings about the pipeline expansion in the last few years. At those where Logistics appeared, its representatives repeated over and over that the work would be done using Pennsylvania labor and sub-contractors. From my observations, these public statements were false. All the trucks on the pipeline right of way have New York State license plates and identify the owners' locations also in NY. Even the road signs ("Flagger Ahead," "One Lane Road Ahead," etc.) all appear to have been rented from a business in the Finger Lakes region of NY. The backs of the signs bear the legend "CSPNY" followed by a phone number in the 607 Elmira - Ithaca - Auburn NY area code. It turns out that the CSPNY abbreviation is used by a company whose trucks are also heavily in evidence on the project. These trucks bear the logo "CTC." This is the logo of "Certified Safety Products of NY, Inc." That concern also uses the CSPNY name mentioned above. CTC is located at 807 State Route 417, Andover, NY 14806-0506 http://www.ctcsigns.com/ On the sides of some of the trenching / drilling equipment appears the logo of Ellingson Trenchless LLC. That company's address is West Concord, MN 55985-0068. http://www.ellingsontrenchless.com/ Other trucks on the project display the logo of "Otis." Otis Eastern Service LLC's address is Marcellus Fairway, Wellsville, NY 14895. https://otiseastern.com/ Yet another Logistics' subcontractor is apparently CATS Sweeping, LLC. It is based in Sewell, NJ. http://www.thebluebook.com/iProView/801125/cats-sweeping-llc/subcontractors/ Logistics' has the obvious right to sub-contract its work to whatever enterprises it choses. But it calls Logistics' credibility into serious question when its designated representatives make public statements that its subsequent conduct belies.

Because Logistics has apparently not been truthful in its use of Pennsylvania sub-contractors, it has severely undermined its own credibility. Thus, its reneging on the method of laying its pipeline through central Exton and the rest of West Whiteland Township as well as its rationale for this change is cast into considerable doubt. Your department should require adherence to the original proposed pipeline laying technique - HDD. (156)

This past Tuesday I attended a township meeting regarding the Mariner East 2 Pipeline. I live in the blast zone and am extremely concerned that my home and my village od Exton will be ruined.

My home is 450ft from this pipeline and so I have received a letter from Sunoco informing me that drilling will occur to place two new pipelines carrying gases (ethane, propane and butane) that if leaked are explosive.

Leak detection is not a robust method and therefore a leak may not be detected for some time creating potential for an explosive event. I am worried about my home, my family's health and safety and the flora and fauna in Exton, PA. These pipelines will be shallow installations which increases the chance of a breach.

The contamination to our public well water, destruction of our trees and wetlands will occur and sicken our families and our natural habitat. I know this as it is already occurring in Uwchlan an area not far from me within the same West Whiteland township. Trees have been felled, homes have been shaken to the point that the foundations are impacted, and well water is visibly contaminated.

The Mariner East 2 plan for my neighborhood calls for damming of streams which will cause flooding, disturbing the wildlife, vegetation and migratory birds.

I fear that Pennsylvania has no state body to regulate this pipeline routing.

There is no benefit to the residents of Pennsylvania as 99% of these pipeline gases are shipped overseas to manufacturer plastics in other countries not to even create jobs for Americans.

This type of drilling and installation of pipelines should never be occurring in a highly populated residential area like Exton, PA. Please stop this drilling that is now occurring in Uwchlan, Goshen and West Whiteland and ensure no future drilling in Exton is ever started. (157)

The idea that through "open cut" these pipelines would only be 3-4 feet below the surface and within 100 feet of multiple elementary schools, public libraries, two very popular shopping areas, as well as a senior community, is frightening to say the least. How do you propose evacuating hundreds of young children or incapacitated seniors quickly and safely away from odorless, highly combustible gases?

The recent fire at Barclay Friends in West Chester borough presents a good example of the challenges our first responders would face trying to evacuate frail and disabled people one mile, uphill, on foot as "best practices" dictate.

"Open cut" would also have a devastating and long-lasting impact to our local environment, destroying historic trees and wetlands that have been central to our community for hundreds of years.

Apparently, Sunoco/ETP is also considering relocating a disputed valve station and flare stack to Exton. How much more risk and can they introduce into our community before someone holds them accountable?

Unfortunately, it has become quite clear to the people who live and work in Exton that Sunoco/ETP are not the community partners that they claim to be. Greater oversight is needed at the state and local levels to ensure that they are complying with zoning ordinances and laws, environmental regulations and, above all, that they are putting our safety and the safety of our environment first. I am writing as a concerned citizen with a family living in Meadowbrook Manor, Exton PA. I have deep concerns about the Sunoco pipeline project that is planned for our neighborhood. This project is seriously dangerous to humans and the environment. These pipes containing high pressure gas will be in a known flood area. During hurricane Irene I had water 10 ft. from my house. The ground can easily erode and compromise the integrity of the pipes leading to potentially disastrous leaks. This area has wetlands, streams and 100 year floodways which are home to wildlife, migratory birds and old growth trees all of which would be threatened by dams, disturbance and pollution. This project calls for a blast zone and open cut which will destroy trees and habitat. The minimum requirement of 48" of cover over the pipeline is grossly insufficient. These residents had no idea and drank the poisoned water for an extended period. The gas is heavy and a leak would potentially threaten Meadowbrook Manor residents, Chester County Library and Giant patrons, Exton Mall shoppers and Little League players at the adjacent park. This entire area is no longer the rural landscape that it was when the old pipeline was installed. It has become a populated suburb and is unsuitable for this project.

I want this pipeline out of Exton and I need you to take a stand now. Won't you please use your voice to protect the people? Please put your constituents ahead of Sunoco's pockets. (161)

This is the type of "incident" we are facing should this proposed Mariner 2 pipeline be allowed to continue on its current path.

I live within the evacuation zone of the pipeline route running through Chester County. I have grown truly alarmed as I've learned more about the product to run through these pipes, and the very real, very likely "incident" risk based on the statistics in Sunoco's safety records. If ignorance is bliss, knowledge is galvanizing.

Now I have learned that in response to the August agreement with the Environmental Hearing Board to "modify their horizontal directional drilling construction method to prevent FURTHER damage to our local water supply OR relocate the pipeline", Sunoco proposes to begin a construction method called "open trenching" through our highly populated community instead.

THIS IS NOT THE ANSWER. The answer is to re-route the pipeline to a rural route. Chester and Delaware Counties are far too populated and congested for this route to be viable from a public safety standpoint, period. The current route runs within a few hundred FEET of the Mall, the County Library, several Elementary and Middle SCHOOLS, several RETIREMENT COMMUNITIES, many very heavily traveled roads including highways with trucks carrying flammable and explosive materials, and MANY HUNDREDS of homes.

The material in these pipes is highly explosive - a cell phone or car starter can trigger a blast. It is odorless, unlike natural gas, and colorless. It is heavier than air, so unlike a natural gas leak that would rise and dissipate in the air, this material stays concentrated low to the ground and seeks low elevations like valleys - or basements.

It remains concentrated and explosive for an hour or more and there is NO WARNING AT ALL. Someone starting their car in their garage can set it off.

For a product that is to be shipped overseas to make plastic, with absolutely NO benefit to Pennsylvania or to the communities it endangers, there is simply no rational, ethical, moral or financial justification to allow this route to stand. YOU HAVE POWER. I urge you to find some way to stop this train wreck before it happens. (174)

After investigation by the DEP, Sunoco has been reprimanded for not reporting the multiple violations that were losses of circulation of drilling solution and possibly polluting ground water starting in August and finally stopping in November. This is not the first time this has happened. Wells were compromised in Exton, PA just a few months ago.

Now Sunoco has requested to change its path and drilling process to put the Mariner East 2 pipeline under much of the Exton area by trenching through the Exton Library land and the Exton Mall. This new path goes through wetlands and a highly populated area. This just increases the danger for the 18000 residents and the people driving through our township each day.

My house is all ready in the blast zone at the intersection of S. Ship Road and Michele Drive. Now when I go to the Library or my doctor at Mainline Health Care or just drive up Lancaster Pike I will continue to be in a blast zone. Sunoco has basically ruined my quality of life because of their need to send liquified gases through their new corporate endeavor called Mariner East 2. Plus the emergency plan that is in place for the residents and the schools, if or should I say when there is a leak in the finished pipeline, is to not use a car due to spark which may ignite the heavy liquified gas, but to walk out 3 miles in the opposite direction, to safety. How will we get our assistant living residents 3 miles away from the blast zone when emergency vehicles are not allowed in the leak area? Or the school children from Exton Elementary, or me?

I believe your organization needs to reevaluate the trust worthiness of Sunoco's truthfulness in dealing with the state and local government and its residents. Sunoco's goal is to push this project through to make money. We have many examples of their staff not following the rules, not notifying the agencies of problems, and not valuing our property, wetlands, population and rule of law. The cold hard facts are that Sunoco has the feeling of entitlement to do as they wish without consideration about the consequence of their actions.

Please, do not accept their new request and please stop Sunoco from putting this project through our populated areas. This is just another tragedy waiting to happen, and for what? We as Pennsylvanians gain nothing from this project, and have the possibility of losing everything including our lives. (179)

181. Comment

I am writing you to express my concern over Sunoco Mariner East2 Pipeline new plan to go thru the heart of Exton. As it passes the library, this approach destroys

many of the remaining old-growth trees and much of the only significant remaining wetland in the center of Exton. And it runs right through the heart of downtown Exton, alongside the library and two major shopping malls, creating a massive, unnecessary danger to hundreds of people every day.

Sunoco failed to consider alternative routes. Sunoco filed the report with the DEP as the result of an agreement the company signed in August with the Clean Air Council and two other environmental groups. By the terms of that agreement, Sunoco is required to "...propose modification of the design of the HDD or relocation of the pipeline..."

But Sunoco has not met that requirement. It has not seriously considered relocation. Instead of insisting on routing the pipeline through the center of Exton, why didn't Sunoco consider a route through rural countryside a quarter of a mile to the north, on the other side of Ship Road? The damage to the environment would be far less, and the risks in the event of a leak would be dramatically smaller. But neither this nor any other alternative route was even considered.

The only reason the report gives for sticking to this route is that the company "routed the Project to be co-located with existing pipeline and other utility corridors to avoid new 'greenfield' routing alignments, to the maximum extent practicable." That was already a weak argument when the pipeline was to be located far underground; but now that Sunoco is proposing to locate it near the surface, it is disastrous.

This plan must be stopped. (180)

182. Comment

I am outraged that the DEP would even consider Sunoco's request to be permitted to route the Mariner East 2 pipelines directly through Exton by open trenching. I am friends with people whose yard abuts the pipeline and they have young children. This is an unacceptable risk to their health and the health of our US citizenry. The agreement reached this past August with the Environmental Hearing Board proposed that Sunoco modify their HDD method to prevent further damage to local water sources or relocate the pipeline. Instead Sunoco wants to use trenching through the most congested part of central downtown Exton close to the busy library and two major shopping centers. This would create not only massive congestion problems but unnecessary risks to thousands of people in the area if the pipeline should rupture.

Sunoco's rationale for this route is totally unacceptable since it will result in the most disturbance and risks to the residents and customers in this area. They have not provided any valid rationale for not relocating the pipeline to a nearby less congested route which would result in far less damage to our environment and expose far fewer residents to the risks from pipeline leaks or ruptures.

For these reasons I urge you to disapprove Sunoco requests to trench through central Exton.' (181)

I am writing in response to your letter dated 11/6/17 regarding the fact that Sunoco will be/has been conducting drilling for Mariner East 2 within 450 feet of the private water well on my property at 306 Exton Lane, Exton PA 19341. The scientific studies below document rapid groundwater flow through caves, fractures, and faults in my aquifer. This rapid groundwater flow could easily lead to immediate and irrevocable contamination of my family's well water and a loss of potability. Further, based on the contamination that occurred to other private wells in the Exton area recently, and the high risk of damage to small wells because of the permeability of the ground in the area of my well, the probability of contamination is high. Therefore, I am requesting that DEP require Sunoco to pay for the cost of disconnecting my home from a private well and connecting it to city water to avoid the real possibility of catastrophic damage to the water coming into my home and the dramatic loss of real estate value that would ensue should such damage occur. The cost of doing so is prohibitive for me as an individual homeowner, and since the high risk is due to no fault of my own, the DEP must require Sunoco to bear the connection costs.

Sunoco failed to consider alternate routes which would be less impactful, and I believe they should be required to do so.

Because of the short timeline offered in your letter to respond to Sunoco's actions, I also request an extension to consult with a private geologist and an environmental lawyer to legally represent me in this matter and I reserve my right to submit additional comments or take any other legal action I deem appropriate beyond the deadline you have given in this letter (11/20/17).

Thank you for your attention to this matter – I look forward to your response. (182)

184. Comment

I am a resident of West Whiteland Township (Exton) in Chester County and am very concerned about the routing of the Mariner East II pipeline through our community. While we have a number of pipelines (including Mariner East I), none of these to date is carrying NGL (natural gas liquids) products. As you are aware, NGLs such as ethane, butane and propane are highly volatile when transported as liquids under

pressure. While it is difficult to avoid high density areas for the pipeline in the Philadelphia area, there has not been much effort to route these away from housing developments, office parks, schools, and shopping centers. My greatest concern is the possibility of a massive explosion and fire in the event of a rupture. This can produce a fireball with a radius of up to 1100 feet from the blast center if immediate ignition occurs. Even more dangerous would be a delayed ignition after the vapor has had time to migrate from the rupture site. If ignition occurs 3 minutes after a rupture, the fire radius would extend 1800 feet from the center (from the Quest Consultants study for Middletown Township - http://www.middletowncoalition.org/)

Most of the pipeline route through the township is by Horizontal Directional Drilling (HDD). There have already been numerous HDD problems including a frac-out in our neighborhood (Michele and Lisa Drive) on the November 11th. This is due to the fact that the soil and bedrock are not stable enough. This increases the danger of a gas leak at the surface. The line also passes under the Amtrak mainline where a leak could be ignited by sparks from a train passing by (either from the wheels or the 11000 volt overhead lines).

Near the center of Exton a new proposal is to build the line by trenching as the geology of this section does not make HDD feasible. This places the pipeline much closer to the surface where it is routed directly behind the Exton Mall as well as another shopping center. A leak here would be a major disaster with the potential of several thousand people being in the blast zone. Safe evacuation is all but impossible as cars could not be used due the the ignition hazard. A more likely scenario would be an explosion occurring without warning killing and injuring hundreds.

The only safe solution is to reroute the pipeline away from the Exton Mall. Until a safe alternative is found, I propose that all work on the pipeline in this area be suspended. My concern is that a major explosion can occur without warning both in the trenched section as well as the HDD portion of the line which includes three high density housing developments as well as several single family neighborhoods.

In closing I appreciate your consideration on the comments above and hope that a better solution can be found. (183)

186. Comment

We, the residents of Meadowbrook Manor in Exton, PA (West Whiteland Township), have grave concerns about the proposed changes to the Mariner 2 pipelines through our neighborhood. Many of our homes are directly affected by the project, and all of our homes lie within the 1200 foot area of increased danger called the "Blast Zone." The biased information presented on short notice by the oil company does not satisfy our right to know that our safety and quality of life will be respected. The recent proposed changes would increase the negative impact to our community, including the following ways:

- •Damming and trenching through the floodway in a SFHA presents risks to wetlands, streams, and related ecosystems (e.g. trout runs), and may radically alter the drainage patterns of our neighborhood and the larger township water management plan.
- •Tree coverage in the wetlands by the Exton Mall would be removed as stated in the trenching plan. Trees are maintained as a buffer between our neighborhood and the Exton Mall commercial area, and restoration (if even possible) would take many years, leaving our neighborhood exposed to light and noise pollution.
- •Vibration, noise, and waste related to trenching would adversely affect neighbors and businesses. As an example, foundations and interior surfaces show damage in adjacent communities where trenching has occurred.

Given HDD is no longer an option, finding an alternate path would avoid the abovementioned environmental issues and reduce the risk profile in case of leak or possible damage to the pipelines in this highly populated area. Please add my name to the list of concerned parties that want to ensure our local agencies respond to events in their jurisdictions that affect the lives of our residents. Construction in our area must be halted and the comment period must be extended to allow for further study and consideration. (186)

187. Comment

I am writing to express my concern and confusion over the approval given to Sunoco to continue with the pipeline project in the area of Chester County. Why does this continue? It has been proven harmful to the environmental, e.g., the gas leaks into well water. Why does the Department that is mandated to protect the environment permit its destruction? How do you reconcile forcing people to discontinue septic systems and install and tie-into sewer systems with the installation of a pipeline that

has no safeguards, has contaminated the environment with gas leaks, and has no accountability to the citizens - the RESIDENTS - of this community?

As a Chester County resident I was subjected to DEP's insistence that individual home septic systems be abandoned in favor of a community sewer system. DEP based its insistence on faulty information and misleading outdated documentation prepared and presented by DEP's public contractor. The underlying reason advanced in favor of discontinuation of septic systems was the real and potential harm caused to the environment, in particular, water, because of poorly and improperly maintained septic systems.

There were several citizens whose knowledge and expertise revealed the falsity of the statements and assertions. (I am not one of those citizens but I am the recipient of their hard work.)

Against that backdrop the DEP now has approved the Sunoco pipeline which has no safeguards, is a proven environmental contaminator, and has no accountability to the citizenry for health and environmental damage.

Like my many neighbors, I strongly urge you to put a stop to this campaign to destroy the environment and to subject the citizens of this area to the harmful pollutants and to a hazardous environment. (187)

188. Comment

First and foremost, my biggest concern is for my family and neighbors. Greed is the culprit here and Sunoco and the company they hired to drill do not care about the lives of my 2 young children. They do not care about the loss of trees and wetlands and its inhabitants. Please help us stop this madness. (133)

192. Comment

I am writing as a concerned citizen with a friends living in Meadowbrook Manor, Exton PA, and I frequently shop at Exton Mall and use the Chester County Library. I have deep concerns about the Sunoco pipeline project that is planned for this neighborhood. This project is seriously dangerous to humans and the environment. These pipes containing high pressure gas will be in a known flood area. The ground can easily erode and compromise the integrity of the pipes leading to potentially disastrous leaks. This area has wetlands, streams and 100 year floodways which are home to wildlife, migratory birds and old growth trees all of which would be threatened by dams, disturbance and pollution. This project calls for a blast zone and open cut which will destroy trees and habitat. The minimum requirement of 48" of cover over the pipeline is grossly insufficient.

This project is an enormous threat to municipal and private wells alike. There have already been cases of wells being poisoned in a nearby neighborhood. These residents had no idea and drank the poisoned water for an extended period. This is utterly and completely outrageous, not to mention the blatant disregard for the safety of citizens, all in the name of money. I completely oppose the construction of this pipeline through my neighborhood as well as through any area of Pennsylvania. Please let me know what other actions I can take against this pipeline. I would like to first introduce myself Susan Troisi, I have lived in Meadowbrook Manor for over 10 years.

My Aunt purchased this house on Hillside Drive in January of 2007. We had no idea of this project or we would never have purchased here. The realtors nor the homeowners gave us any information or never mentioned a project like this. I was the caregiver for my Aunt, who had Alzheimer's and has since passed away. We had decided as a family not to sell after she passed due to the loss of property values and now several years later they are back to where we were. We were planning to sell in 2018, now we'll be lucky if anything moves in Meadowbrook Manor for years due to this project.

My husband is disabled and both of us are nearing retirement age —so selling would be the usual thing to do since we can no longer afford the maintenance (lawn and bushes) up keep and taxes.

Now --- we must suffer the project situation---

- 1. Dust
- 2. Dirty roads
- 3. Possible leaks, smells of some origin
- 4. Water problems
- 5. Noisy machinery
- 6. Traffic and parking of vehicles
- 7. Sickness from the chemicals and dust particles in the air (I have asthma) many bronchial and breathing problems too.
- 8. Early morning noise- time limits that we know won't be adhered to
- 9. Safety for our children and grandchildren
- 10. Possible earth movement/sink holes
- 11. Breathing issues and overall health changes.
- 12. Dishes and Heirlooms shaking from the drilling (similar to mild earthquakes)

The above mentioned issues are concerns of many many neighbors and residents of EXTON and other nearby communities. We are not the only people suffering but we are concerned for our families and the children for everyone's future. How can you explain to your children/grandchildren that they can't come over because you have bad water, no showers, no tubs and surely never drinking the water. It started—several residents from another neighborhood have brown water, now we do not have a well, but if there are leaks or seepage from the pipeline or drilling or dams being used where they should not be we all could suffer most of the above issues.

So—between leaks, dust, dirt, chemicals, noise, smells that we don't even know and holes in the yards--- who wants to raise a family and have to worry about this, there are enough stresses in normal everyday life we all should not be subjected to this in our homes.

Thank you for viewing and reading our emails. As a senior citizen---- we thought these upcoming years were the "Golden Years" that's a laugh! (203)

202. Comment

Please do NOT allow Sunoco to run Mariner 2 to run through Exton, PA, near the library and shopping center, businesses, and medical facilities. Do NOT allow the pipe to be installed via open trenching, so near the surface. Regardless of depth, many people will be killed, if there is a breech in the pipe.

Please at least re-route the pipeline through an area that is not as inhabited.

Best of all, please STOP Mariner 2, and any pipelines to follow, that carry explosive gas products. Stop the flow of the explosive gasses, forced under pressure to liquid form, through OLD pipes that already exist.

Rethink easements that were granted 50 or more years ago, when our area was not as built up.

Please, keep our aquifers safe and undisturbed, so we have clean drinking water, for survival of humans, animals, and vegetation.

Please STOP the pipeline altogether. My husband and I live 130 feet from a drilling station, and pipeline. The hell of the noise and vibration has caused damage to our kitchen lights, door frames, etc. My husband has Parkinson's disease, and he has greatly deteriorated in the last 6 months since the drilling has taken place. He just got out of the hospital, and is now in rehab. His condition rapidly worsened. Four neighbors are dealing with cancer, and have to bear the vibration of their homes, and the noise. We live in an over 55 community, where many need to be in their homes a lot, if not confined to their homes, due to health issues.

Our homes are devalued. My home could not be sold at all right now, with the messy drilling station just off our deck. There had been open space, trees, and a fence for

the gated community, before Sunoco/Energy Transfer partners seized the land, and chopped down our trees. We cannot have the trees back. My husband may very soon need assisted living, or much expensive care in our home. The sale of our home might have provided the funds needed to pay for this. This has caused extreme stress for all who live in the area.

Sunoco has cause much damage to our community, the environment, to our health, wells, water systems, and they have put fear in the hearts of residents of all ages, that we will be incinerated. How awful that schools need drills to evacuate children, and first responders will need to be trained to deal with huge incinerated sections of homes and people.

Please, protect us, by holding firm to strict regulations for pipelines. Have them placed far away from populated areas. Insist that the gas products be used close to the source, so they do not have to be transported. Build plastic plants near the sites.

Please, encourage wind and solar sources of clean energy.

Thank you. Please protect us, our lives, property, and the environment. Do not allow Eminent Domain. Do what you can to deny Sunoco, or any company, to have the status as a public utility. It is not a public utility. (205)

I live in Exton, West Whiteland Township, Chester County. I am writing to express my opposition to the Mariner East 2 pipeline that is scheduled to transect our community. My property is designated as a Certified Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation. Sunoco plans to destroy our landscaping in order to install 20" and 16" pipelines through an open cut. Our landscaping has been meticulously shaped over a span of 42 years to use native plantings that provide food and shelter for birds and other wildlife.

Additionally, Sunoco plans to dam and/or trench through two streams (including Valley Creek, a trout run) and a wetland in our community. With 'frac-outs' of directional drilling mud having surfaced in locales like Brookhaven, Goshen, Middletown, Thornbury and Edgmont Township due to construction of the Mariner East 2 Pipeline (Backyard frac-out and sinkhole near Exton) the right choice is not known to me but the implications of the wrong choice could be grave. Sunoco has behaved unacceptably in the construction of its Mariner 2 Pipeline here in Chester County. They intentionally mislocated their pumping station next to the East Goshen firehouse, creating serious potential problems in the event of a pipeline emergency. They have failed to communicate as directed by you with local transportation companies such as Amtrak or with township boards of supervisors, promising information that never materialized. They have been slow to report leaks, often only coming forward after the local news media has publicized the issue. There seems to be no accountability, leaving them free to do whatever.

As a former railroad employee early in my career, I am acutely aware of the dangers of moving some of the products that will traverse the pipeline. I recognize that pipelines are probably much safer than rail and than truck. 226. Comment

Sunoco originally planned to put the Dragonpipe (Mariner East 2 pipeline) under much of the Exton area by drilling. According to its new plans, however, it wants to run the pipeline through the heart of Exton mostly by trenching.

This is a terrible proposal. Full details are in a report that Sunoco submitted to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). In the report, Sunoco claims this route "avoids and minimizes new and permanent impacts on previously undisturbed land, land use encumbrance, and site-specific and cumulative impacts on land, environmental, and community resources."

In fact, this plan does the opposite. As it passes the library, this approach destroys many of the remaining old-growth trees and much of the only significant remaining wetland in the center of Exton. And it runs right through the heart of downtown Exton, alongside the library and two major shopping malls, creating a massive, unnecessary danger to hundreds of people every day. (The "blast zone", where near-total destruction would occur if the pipeline ruptured and ignited, is shown by the yellow shading in the map above.)

Sunoco failed to consider alternative routes. Sunoco filed the report with the DEP as the result of an agreement the company signed in August with the Clean Air Council and two other environmental groups. By the terms of that agreement, Sunoco is required to "...propose modification of the design of the HDD or relocation of the pipeline..."

But Sunoco has not met that requirement. It has not seriously considered relocation. Instead of insisting on routing the pipeline through the center of Exton, why didn't Sunoco consider a route through rural countryside a quarter of a mile to the north, on the other side of Ship Road? The damage to the environment would be far less, and the risks in the event of a leak would be dramatically smaller. But neither this nor any other alternative route was even considered.

The only reason the report gives for sticking to this route is that the company "routed the Project to be co-located with existing pipeline and other utility corridors to avoid new 'greenfield' routing alignments, to the maximum extent practicable." That was already a weak argument when the pipeline was to be located far underground; but now that Sunoco is proposing to locate it near the surface, it is disastrous. This plan must be stopped. (228)

227. Comment

I am writing in regards to Sunoco's proposed open cut trenching in Exton, PA in West Whiteland Township at the Swedesford Road Crossing. Considering Sunoco's blatant disregard for public safety in and around Chester County, I cannot see how this can be allowed. They have failed to report leaks, contaminated water, and did not notify SEPTA or AMTRAK of their plans as stipulated by the DEP. Sunoco has already cut down hundreds of trees, and in many places, with no plan to replant any in the future. Their new proposal will destroy many more trees and wetlands, as well as threaten the public library and local businesses. Please do not allow this! (229, 230)

228. Comment

I strongly urge you to stop the Mariner 2 East Pipeline's proposal to open trench across Exton, PA. It is a highly-populated area, with several streams and areas of schools, ball fields, etc that would be impacted in the case of a pipeline leak (which, with the track record of Sunoco, would not be at all surprising). Additionally, this area is heavy with limestone underground, so is very susceptible to sink holes (which has already happened). If a pipeline is to be built in our area, it should ONLY travel through non-populated areas.

I am firmly opposed to the project coming anywhere close to the populated Exton community. (231)

Please stop any further construction on this pipeline as it is a danger to all the communities in its path and all the citizens who live and work here. (209)

I am writing to strongly urge you to stand with citizens and the environment against Sunoco's Mariner East 2 pipeline. No corporation should be allowed to impose such destruction of property and environment while introducing life-threatening hazards to the population. The proximity of this hazard to schools, libraries, and densely populated shopping and living areas is appalling. A substance this volatile (going overseas to produce plastic bags) does not belong near any community, human or otherwise, especially while it cannot be transported with absolute certainty of containment. Sunoco's track record for containing hazardous substances, as demonstrated by past leaks, does not inspire any such confidence. The use of imminent domain to seize private property, not for a social good, but to benefit other private interests is contrary to the spirit of our great nation, regardless of party.

It's time to step up and act according to that mission instead of catering to corporate greed. I thank you in advance for protecting our environment and citizens. (232)

231. Comment

I want to register my protest as a resident of the region against the egregious abuse of power that has allowed Sunoco to declare this pipeline a public utility. This pipeline puts our children, our seniors and ourselves at unnecessary risk to enhance the profits of a private company.

Please stop the dangerous route and practices involved in completion of this pipeline now and take a balanced approach which at least considers the wellbeing of the residents who should be your primary concern. (233)

232. Comment

Please accept the following comments in response to the HDD Reevaluation Report submitted by Sunoco Pipeline, L.P. for DEP Permit number E15-862, HDD Reference number PA-CH-0219.0000 filed on November 3, 2017.

Following my review of this report, I have a number of significant concerns related to the stated environmental impacts and the potential for additional contamination of private wells in this area. This reevaluation report indicates that Sunoco utilized the PAGWIS system and sent certified letters to those landowners within 450 feet of the revised HDD alignment. This letter requests that the landowner contact the Right-of-Way agent if they have a private well on their property and if they would like to have their well sampled. The stipulated agreement and original permit approval for this project highlight the importance of protecting private groundwater resources. However, this project has already resulted in the contamination of over a dozen private wells in West Whiteland Township to date and I question if Sunoco is able to complete this project without permanently impacting additional wells. While the

report indicates that Sunoco will initiate contact by phone or in person if they do not respond to the certified letter, I must ask what measure of accountability the Department has inplace to ensure that this action is taken. Further, Sunoco indicates that when a private well is located, they will provide the landowner with alternative water supplies until HDD is complete. This indicates that Sunoco does not feel that they can complete this project without direct impacts to private water supplies - a fact that I find extremely concerning and one that certainly requires additional clarification.

The reevaluation also indicates that Sunoco plans to change previously approved HDD to open cut construction techniques. This modification will have significant environmental and quality-of-life disruptions for those who live and work in West Whiteland Township. The report indicates that open cut techniques will cross at least two tributaries to Valley Creek (an exceptional value waterway) and will result in direct impacts to a number of wetlands. Further, open cut construction will create significant disruption in a highly populated area. The proposed route encroaches within a few feet of homes, crosses a little league ball field, public library, and commercial centers. This modification will seriously impact the daily activities and quality of life for anyone along this route and, as such, I request that the Department host a public meeting to discuss these impacts with citizens prior to consideration or approval of such a change from HDD to open cut construction.

Finally, the HDD Hydrogeologic Revaluation Report provided by Groundwater & Environmental Services, Inc. (GES) dated October 16, 2017, clearly demonstrates that the information available is insufficient. In this report, GES explains that the proposed HDD route will traverse areas of known Karst formations, and that this type of rock formation is, "prone to sinkhole development and solution openings, and should be thoroughly investigated before construction." Further, GES states that, "The risk of losing drilling fluids, of IRs, of groundwater flowback discharges and of lowering of the local water table could not be assessed given the available information. Deeper cores, to the elevation of the planned lowest point and representative water level measurement s are needed to assess those risks. A geophysical study is required to determine the extent of karst development along the profile, especially in light of installation challenges that are being experienced due south, including excessive groundwater discharge; loss of fluids, and difficulties steering the pilot hole."

Based on the expert analysis of hydrogeologists contracted by Sunoco, the information gathered is insufficient to comprehensively assess the environmental and property impacts. The Department should require such studies be completed before consideration. While Sunoco has gone through the motions of reevaluation, it is clear that the information provided is insufficient. It is my strong recommendation that the Department reject this report as incomplete and require Sunoco to perform complete impact evaluations to ensure construction activities does not cause permanent and irreparable harm to the environment and citizens in West Whiteland Township. I am writing to you because the Sunoco/ETP permits referenced above should not be granted for Shoen Road, Exton Baseball Field, and Chester County Library in Exton, PA. The library area is a wetland and allowing a pipeline there will destroy trees, soil and water. It will expose the area to erosion and flooding. We need our wetlands protected as they function as water filtration systems. Also, this is a very highly populated area. It makes no sense and implore you to not allow for this to happen. (235)

234. Comment

There are so many things wrong with Sunoco: frac-outs during drilling spilling hundreds of gallons on bentonite, the loss of trees and wetlands, the threat to the public library and local businesses, the recent incidents with Sunoco's intentional disregard for permit rules and regulations as detailed in recent Notices of Violations in Chester and Berks counties, Sunoco's pattern of failure to report incidents, their clear disregard for public safety as demonstrated by not communicating with SEPTA or AMTRAK as explicitly instructed by DEP, their inability to perform at even the lowest standards. (236)

235. Comment

I have lived in a community in Exton called Meadowbrook Manor for more than 42 years. Our lot is approximately one-third of an acre, and there is an 8" pipeline along our western property line that lies 33' to 50' from the end of our house. The proposed 16" and 20" Mariner 2 pipelines will be placed the minimally allowed distance from this existing pipeline, one on my property and one on property owned by Chester County. The easement for the original pipeline was signed by a previous owner in 1932, when the area encompassing our neighborhood and beyond was farmland. In 2015, Sunoco Pipeline L.P. secured easements along this existing pipeline by right of Eminent Domain and, in our case, threat of legal action.

During the years since 1932, Exton has morphed from farmland to a densely populated residential and commercial area. Exton Public Library and Exton Square Mall are our immediate neighbors to the west. The Mall now houses a satellite branch of Main Line Health for medical services and a Septa bus stop. There are thousands of people at these sites on a daily basis. The two proposed Mariner pipelines and the volatile gases (ethane, butane, and propane) they transport will be within hundreds of feet of my family, my neighbors, and anyone visiting the library or mall. The safety and quality of life in our immediate area will be negatively impacted to a huge degree.

A number of other concerns are of particular importance to Meadowbrook Manor residents. One is the proposed damming and trenching of a branch of Valley Creek that runs through our neighborhood. Many houses here lie within a floodplain. In recent years, two houses were razed because of repeated flooding and a third had its

foundation raised to prevent further flooding. Others homes also experienced flooding in the past of varying degrees of severity.

A second major concern is removal of established trees and landscaping that serve as a buffer from the noise and pollution associated to the neighborhood's close proximity to the mall, its bus terminal, and parking lots (both open and two parking garages). I personally will lose a fifteen-foot buffer of shrubs, perennials, and compact evergreens that I planted and have maintained for decades.

A third concern is for the integrity of our home and others that will likely be affected by the very process of digging, boring, or drilling to install the pipelines. The geology of this area makes it unsuitable. There have been numerous damages to homes and properties as preparation for pipeline installation takes place. No amount of monetary compensation can compensate for the stress and destruction that one continually reads and hears about.

Finally and foremost is concern for the "what if" of a leak of Mariner 2's gases. Our township and those in the surrounding areas have volunteer fire companies that many residents fear are ill equipped to deal with a catastrophic event. Sunoco has donated money for training county first responders, but there are too residences, businesses, and too much traffic to feel secure. It would behoove the Public Utility Commission and the Department of Environmental Protection to "walk the pipeline" and reconsider the location of Mariner 2. (237)

236. Comment

The area around the Chester County Library has a stream and mature trees. Trenching through that area would disturb the natural beauty that has taken decades to mature to look like it currently does. With the pipeline close to the surface, those trees would not be able to be replanted. I don't want to see the area changed. (238)

237. Comment

- 1. Public AQUA Water Supply -- The Mariner East project demonstrably contaminated well water in the Exton area earlier in 2017. Considering that the Exton public water supply also draws on underground aquifers, how does this project guarantee that public water also will not be contaminated by the drilling process?
- 2. Structural Damage -- Per the Sunoco notification letter, our home is within 450 feet of the horizontal directional drilling section adjacent to Swedesford Road. We are concerned about structural damage to our property from the bore and open cut pipeline construction.
- 3. Sinkholes -- We are concerned that the pipeline will exacerbate and increase the number of sinkholes in the Exton area. This can damage our property value and quality of our residential development.

In general, we have great concern and reservations that Sunoco chose such a heavily populated area for this disruptive and damaging project. (239)

238. Comment

I am a concerned constituent with 12 years experience working as an Environmental Scientist in West Chester. I hope that you will do everything you can to prevent this pipeline from being built. It will certainly violate Article 1, Section 27 of the Pennsylvania Constitution:

"The people have a right to clean air, pure water, and to the preservation of the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic values of the environment. Pennsylvania's public natural resources are the common property of all of the people, including generations yet to come. As trustee of these resources, the Commonwealth shall conserve and maintain them for the benefit of all the people." (240)

239. Comment

Pursuant to the Corrected Stipulated Order entered on EHB Docket No. 2017-009-L on August 10, 2017 ("Settlement"), and on behalf of Clean Air Council, Mountain Watershed Association, Inc., and the Delaware Riverkeeper Network ("Appellants"), please accept these comments on Sunoco Pipeline L.P.'s ("Sunoco") re-evaluation report ("Report") for the horizontal directional drilling ("HDD") indicated by drawing numbers PA-CH-0219.0000-RD and PA-CH-0219.0000- RD-16 (the "HDD Site").

As Sunoco proposes a major modification, Appellants should be clear that these comments are not necessarily the final comments Appellants will make on the proposal. Appellants reserve the right to comment during the official public comment period on the fuller set of application materials.

The Department's Review

Pennsylvanians rely on the Department of Environmental Protection to protect them from dangerous activities that threaten their air, water, land, and health. The Department has recognized that the construction of Mariner East 2 has done damage to the public already. The purpose of Sunoco's re-evaluations of certain HDD sites is so that it does a better job avoiding harm to the public and the environment in its HDD construction. The Department's role is to review and assess Sunoco's Report before deciding what action to take on it.

It is the Department's duty to review and assess the Report with protecting the public and the environment placed first and foremost. Looking at the individual circumstances at the site in question is key. Critically important is accounting for input from those who live nearby, who have a deeper connection with and greater knowledge about the land than the foreign company building the pipelines through it.

A meaningful, objective and substantive review and assessment by the Department will ensure that new or further HDD operations at the re-evaluated sites will cause

minimal, if any, harm to the public and the environment. Anything less than a full, careful, and objective review would endanger the public and the environment. Pennsylvanians place their trust in the Department to do a thorough, science-based assessment, taking into account these and other comments, and approving Sunoco's recommendation only if it would protect the public and the environment from any further harm.

Comments on HDDs PA-CH-0219.0000-RD and PA-CH-0219.0000-RD-16

1. The "flex-bore" proposal is not fully fleshed out in the Report and differs from what is presented in the revised plans.

At the HDD Site, Sunoco proposes to "utilize a new drilling and reaming technology that is a combination of HDD and conventional auger boring methods called 'flexbore'." See "Inadvertent Returns Discussion" in the Report. Sunoco has not said so, but Appellants presume Sunoco means to refer to Barbco's FlexBor system.

Sunoco describes the system in its Inadvertent Returns Discussion. It writes, "A 'flex-bore' machine does not utilize bentonite as an additive to create a 'mud slurry' to carry cuttings during the pilot and reaming phases." But it is unclear whether a standard HDD setup with bentonite slurry is used to drill the pilot phase. Sunoco does not say. It does say, "During the pilot hole phase, a standard, but smaller, diameter drilling tool and bottom hole assembly is used to drill the designed profile." No mention is made of what, if any, lubricant is used for that phase.

The same odd omission is present in Barbco's promotional materials for FlexBor. See http://www.barbco.com/wp-content/uploads/2016/06/3988 FlexBor-Brochure HR-2-1.pdf . "The pilot hole is obtained using conventional methods (i.e. utilizing a horizontal directional drill)." Presumably bentonite slurry is used there

On July 27, 2017, Sunoco submitted an affidavit on EHB Docket No. 2017-009-L of David Runte, Senior Director Engineering / Senior Project Director of Energy Transfer Partners and Sunoco Pipeline L.P. In paragraph 8 of his affidavit, Mr. Runte testified that the pilot phase of HDD is the phase with the greater risk of an inadvertent return.

In order to understand the risks involved, the Department should request from Sunoco what exactly it is proposing with respect to "flex-bore" before making a determination as to the proposal.

Furthermore, the FlexBor materials linked to above indicate that a bore pit similar to that of a conventional auger bore is needed to operate its machinery, at least on one end of the drill.

However, the revised plans and HDD profiles Sunoco attached do not show a bore pit at either end of the revised drill. If that is the case, the entry angle also is clearly wrong—it should be close to zero degrees at at least one end of each of the 20-inch and 16-inch revised designs.

Sunoco needs to explain what is happening with these revised plans or amend the plans to make them consistent with what would actually happen using "flex-bore" machinery.

Finally, while FlexBor is likely a safety improvement over conventional HDD, it should be noted that bentonite itself is not the primary driver in causing most of the water well contamination to- date. Rather, as the Report notes, at the mass contamination incident at the Shoen Road HDD location, "Local groundwater hydraulics and a large difference in elevation between the entry and exit points caused the water supply impact here." HDD Hydrogeologic Reevaluation Report at 9. FlexBor may be one useful tool out of many needed to reduce risk.

Sunoco admits that "The implementation of engineering controls, alternate drilling technology, and drilling best management practices will be required to minimize the occurrence of IRs." However, unlike in some re-evaluation reports, Sunoco has not committed to implement any best management practices. The Department should require such measures, given the known risk to a public water supply, and unknown risks to private water supplies.

2. Sunoco does not appear to have re-evaluated the HDD design since the settlement.

As reflected in Paragraph 2 of the Corrected Stipulated Order, "Sunoco will perform a re- evaluation of the 41 HDDs listed on Exhibit '2' attached hereto." However, Sunoco's proposal appears to date from July, 2017, before the negotiations for the settlement even began. See Attachment 2 to the Report. The language of the Corrected Stipulated Order makes clear that Sunoco must do new evaluation, not simply rely on what it has already done.

Paragraph 4 of the Corrected Stipulated Order requires "re-examin[ation]" of geology, consideration of certain site-specific information, and use of certain scientific data and techniques.

It appears Sunoco made a decision in July as to how it wanted to re-work the HDD Site and has now created a Report affirming that pre-existing decision. This is not what was agreed to and ordered.

In particular, it is not clear that Sunoco has done anything to take into account the problems related to spills and private water well contamination besides what it incidentally did by agreement with Aqua America. The purpose of the re-evaluation

is to provide further protections. Since the entry of the Corrected Stipulated Order, for this HDD Site, Sunoco does not appear to have undertaken that task.

3. The surface impacts and costs to the community are considerable, and alternative routes were not actually considered.

The analysis Sunoco has presented in its Report ignores the considerable and unacceptable surface impacts of the proposal. These impacts are not tallied in its Report, and not readily visible in the plans attached thereto.

However, this Report has garnered a stronger reaction from the public than Appellants have seen yet for an HDD re-evaluation report. The public—particularly Chester County residents who live nearby or frequent the area—have raised a host of concerns the Department should take seriously.

Sunoco now proposes to open-cut through Meadowbrook Manor Park and the Little League fields there. Sunoco also plans to clear a large area surrounding the Chester County Library and District Center, which is a major community center drawing hundreds of thousands of visitors annually. The trees and glade there are beautiful and mature, a major asset to the center.

The area between the Exton Square Mall, the Chester County Library and District Center, Route 30, and a residential neighborhood is also a floodplain highly prone to flooding where, according to reports from residents, two houses have already been lost to flooding.

Residents are concerned as well about the choice to build the project along this little sliver of greenery in a dense and heavily-populated area, with all the risks involved.

This is not even to get into the ecological impacts of deforesting a quarter acre of PFO wetlands.

With all this as background, one would think that Sunoco would take seriously the consideration of alternative routes. The "Re-Route Analysis" in the Report, however, clearly had no thought put into it. The first two sentences are a boilerplate description not site-specific. Sunoco then writes, "The Swedesford Road Crossing HDD is colocated within the existing SPLP 8" pipeline ROW and rerouting would cause new greenfield impacts." The claim that re-routing would cause "new greenfield impacts" is demonstrably false. Sunoco has located this portion of the route along one of the greenest corridors in the area. Plenty of other locations could be considered.

For example, just a little farther south in Chester County, Sunoco has chosen a route largely under Ship Road and Boot Road. That choice created comparatively fewer "greenfield impacts" than routes Sunoco could have taken through woods and residential backyards. There are other asphalt-only options that Sunoco could have consider to avoid the precious few actual green fields in Exton. Pottstown Pike, the

Exton Square Parkway, parking lots for the various commercial outlets in the area—Appellants are not saying any of these are the one correct route, but to claim that these "would cause new greenfield impacts" is either dishonest or ignorant.

Sunoco further claims in the "Re-Route Analysis" that "given the length and general perpendicular direction of streams S-B79 and S-B81 (unnamed tributary to Valley Creek and Creek, respectively), no practicable re-route option lies to the north or south of the proposed route that would not ultimately cross these streams." This is misleading. The pipeline crosses this region north-to-south. Re-route options are necessarily east or west of the area, not north or south of it. The unnamed tributary could be completely avoided by re-routing to the west.

Valley Creek would need to be crossed, but it could be crossed while doing less damage to the surrounding areas if it were crossed at a different location. Sunoco did none of this analysis.

Even a basic honest re-route analysis would consider some of these issues, but Sunoco's did not. The Department should require actual, honest consideration and analysis of alternative routes with the possibility of choosing one, rather than simply and perfunctorily checking a box.

4. The proposed E&S plans suggest excessive and unneeded earth disturbance.

The conversion of HDD to auger boring in some locations should cut down on the temporary workspace needed. However, in some locations, Sunoco is proposing to take significantly more space than what was permitted. It is not clear what the need is for that additional space. In a densely built-up area and within a dangerous floodplain, Sunoco should not be proposing to use additional unneeded space.

Specifically, the workspace at the south end of Meadowbrook Manor Park is enlarged for no apparent reason, as is the area immediately south of the library (within a floodplain and in an area to be bored). South of Route 30, Sunoco proposes to shorten the HDD, ending it farther north. Barbco also advertises that that its FlexBor system can be used in a comparatively "small footprint." See http://www.barbco.com/wp-content/uploads/2016/06/3988_FlexBor-Brochure_HR-2-1.pdf. Yet Sunoco proposes to extend the limits of disturbance all the way north to Route 30 and keep the existing extent of workspace south of the HDD endpoint, thereby increasing the amount of workspace for a shorter HDD.

There may be an explanation for this, but it is not apparent from Sunoco's Report. This should be altered or justified before the Department approves the changes.

5. Sunoco's private water supply information is still incomplete.

Sunoco performed extensive testing and geologic evaluation to ensure its construction would not result in contaminating the nearby Aqua public water well. This is proper.

It has fallen short, however, in evaluating risks to private water supplies, despite a large known risk to quantity and quality of groundwater in the area generally.

Sunoco's landowner outreach plan, explained in the Report's "Adjacent Features Analysis," is stronger than what it conducted at other HDD Sites in that Sunoco will conduct follow-up for landowners who do not respond by mail. However, that has not yet happened. Without that information, Sunoco cannot conduct the well production zone analysis required for their wells by the Corrected Stipulated Order, paragraph 4.ii. Nor, generally speaking, can Sunoco do much to avoid impacts, since it does not know where those residents' wells are.

Again, the point of this re-evaluation process is to use better processes and information to plan these crossings, not to plan them and then produce paper justifying them. It is important that the Department ensure that these analyses are complete before approving them.

Because Sunoco has failed to identify the water supplies and the nature of the water supplies and groundwater near the HDD Site, it cannot determine whether any hydrogeological interference caused by the HDD would put those water supplies at risk. Without that information, the Department cannot approve Sunoco's proposal.

Conclusion

For these reasons, Appellants request that the Department deny Sunoco's reevaluation recommendation for this HDD Site. It is clear based on the risks to water supplies and the damage that would be done by trenching that the choice of route is not appropriate.

Thank you for considering these comments. Please keep us apprised of your next steps on the HDD Site. (241-245)

240. Comment

I urge the DEP to not consider Sunoco's request to be allowed to route the Mariner East 2 pipelines directly through Exton, PA by open trenching.

I have been a resident of Exton for over 18 years and I live very close to the area that will be at risk, and my children attend schools along the blast area. I frequent the Exton Mall, Giant shopping center, Target, and above all the Library regularly and would be directly impacted by this.

I do not believe that this pipeline has any right be be placed in a residential area, and there is no reason to increase the risk of this already dangerous pipeline by allowing the open trenching.

Furthermore, the environmental impact open trenching will have on the ecosystem will be devastating. The responsibility of the PA DEP is to PROTECT the

environment, to act in the best interest of what would be best for the environment, not their own special interests. (246)

241. Comment

I am writing to express my extreme opposition to the pipelines that are coming through or are planned to be routed through Chester County to carry fracking materials. I am in the "blast zone" at 200 N Chester Rd. This degrades safety, property values, and, ultimately, the tax base. The chaotic evacuation during The Barclay fire last week is an example of how ill prepared we are for ANY catastrophe. I have worked at QVC for the past twenty years, and many of my associates moved here for positions at that company. Most of us had planned to stay in Chester County after retirement, but this situation is untenable. And, who in their right minds would want to retire at Hersey's Mill with blast zones throughout the complex? (247)

242. Comment

I strongly urge you to stop Mariner 2 pipeline running through my township of Uwchlan, & also Upper Uwchlan, & West Whiteland Township in Chester County. This pipeline is extremely volatile, colorless & odorless & those of us in the blast zone WILL NOT GET OUT in case of a leak.

Sunoco has already breached our wells, our aquifer, had various spills & is a hazard to our community. Please protect our lives & the lives of our young children, I BEG you.

Please live up to your responsibility & protect your citizens. I beg you, (248)

243. Comment

I am a Family and Consumer Sciences professional and a wild life lover. I am fiercely concerned about the Mariner II pipe line in my back yard. There are many types of wild life here and I believe the pipeline work will destroy their only habitat for miles.

We have deer, rabbits, squares, red fox, ground hog, raccoon, many bird species, hawks and Canada geese, and many more I don't see. It is heart breaking to see these animals displaced; most of their habitat has already been taken.

This is only the tip of this ice berg. Like the Titanic we are sinking because of the misinformation and lies we've been told by the Mariner East II pipe line aka Sonoco Lies:

- #1 The additional line will be in the existing ditch.
- #2 The pipes will carry the same "gas" as the old ones.
- #3 "You won't even know we're here.
- #4 "It's perfectly safe."
- #5 Your property will be restored to before work or better status.
- #6 We will only need a FEW feet of your land.

#7 It won't affect your property values.

These are only a few LIES we've been told.

244. Comment

I am a resident of Uwchlan township and was raised in Uwchlan. I am extremely concerned about how the decisions have been made to permit the dangerous and destructive ME2 pipeline through Pennsylvania, Chester County, and Uwchlan Township. It is unfathomable to me that the DEP apparently chose the interests of Sunoco and ETF over their citizens safety, the quality of the water table, and the preservation of the environment.

I will be working with my neighbors, representatives and others to address this problem in a way that balances commerce and the interests of residents, as should the DEP.

I do not believe the DEP should consider Sunoco's request to be permitted to route the Mariner East 2 pipelines directly through Exton by open trench.

The agreement reached this past August with the Environmental Hearing Board proposed that Sunoco modify their HDD method to prevent further damage to local water sources or relocate the pipeline. Instead Sunoco wants to use trenching through the most congested part of central downtown Exton, close to the busy library, residential areas, and two major shopping centers. This would create not only massive congestion problems but unnecessary risks to thousands of people in the area if the pipeline should rupture.

Sunoco's rationale for this route is totally unacceptable since it will result in the most disturbance and risks to the residents and customers in this area. They have not provided any valid rationale for not relocating the pipeline to a nearby less congested route which would result in far less damage to our environment and expose far fewer residents to the risks from pipeline leaks or ruptures.

For these reasons I urge you to disapprove Sunoco requests to trench through central Exton. (250)

245. Comment

I am writing as a concerned citizen who has friends and family living in Exton PA and a past resident of 7 years. I have deep concerns about the Sunoco pipeline project that is planned for the area. This project is seriously dangerous to humans and the

environment. These pipes containing high pressure gas will be in a known flood area. The ground can easily erode and compromise the integrity of the pipes leading to potentially disastrous leaks. This area has wetlands, streams and 100 year floodways which are home to wildlife, migratory birds and old growth trees all of which would be threatened by dams, disturbance and pollution. This project calls for a blast zone and open cut which will destroy trees and habitat. The minimum requirement of 48" of cover over the pipeline is grossly insufficient. No engineer would ever put their stamp on a project like this.

This project is an enormous threat to municipal and private wells alike. There have already been cases of wells being poisoned in a nearby neighborhood. These residents had no idea and drank the poisoned water for an extended period.

The gas is heavy and a leak would potentially threaten Meadowbrook Manor residents, Chester County Library and Giant patrons, Exton Mall shoppers and Little League players at the adjacent park. This entire area is no longer the rural landscape that it was when the old pipeline was installed. It has become a populated suburb and is unsuitable for this project.

We need you to take a stand now. Please use your voice to protect the people and stop the pipeline from moving forward. (251)

246. Comment

I am a resident of West Goshen Township and am both concerned and annoyed with the Mariner II East pipeline. Sunoco has been irresponsible, the risks are real, the number of troubled citizens (of West and East Goshen, West Whiteland, Middletown and other Townships) many. For example, we've had neighbors' wells recently become polluted by Sunoco and said neighbors told that they MUST suddenly assume the costs of moving from their formerly excellent well water.

We visit the Chester County Library regularly and Exton Mall is our go-to shopping center, so even though we live in West Goshen, we, like so many others, are increasingly at risk by these volatile products. What has worked in northeast PA is not going to work in southeast PA. This risk will not be tolerated.

In March, our friend, John Childe, Esq., won his case before the PA Supreme Court. To wit, the people have the right to clean air and water.

Please stop the construction. (252)

I have lived in Chester County all my life, and in Uwchlan Township for most of it. The ME2 pipeline is a travesty that should never have been approved, if officials cared at all for the citizens of PA and the environment. The people of PA want this pipeline stopped. My husband and I live on 410 Briar Road in Exton PA. The Mariner East 2 pipeline project changed from HDD to open trench digging is set to take place directly in our backyard. Our property is right on the blast zone. We would be the first to evacuate if there was any threat of a leak or potential explosion. We have 4 children and have lived in this house for almost 20 years. Prior to moving to Exton, we lived in an apartment in Olde City, Philadelphia and after that a twin home in Northeast Philadelphia. We saved up and were thrilled to move out of Philadelphia to a single family home in this private secluded neighborhood in Exton, Chester County.

I work from my home. I handle conference calls from my home and conduct online meetings. The noise alone in having this open trench construction take place in our backyard will prevent me from working. The house may shake and the foundation may crack from open trench digging. We already heard about documented cases of cracking foundations and water contamination.

We also have a 5 year old Golden retriever who will have no place to run in a yard for up to 3 years. We are in the yard with our dog every day playing fetch. Our dog needs daily exercise and needs to run. The whole reason we purchased this land was to enjoy the privacy of a backyard. We weren't able to enjoy playing in a yard with our dog in the city.

We have a deck off of our bedroom where we sit, enjoy coffee and take in the beautiful outdoors. This pipeline will destroy the beautiful trees, woods and privacy in our backyard. We frequently see deer, squirrels, foxes, and groundhogs. The wildlife will disappear once open cut starts. There are streams and wetlands in these woods. Sunoco plans to cut down all of these trees. The animals will leave and the streams will dry up. The dirt and destruction alone will be overwhelming and contaminate the environment. We suffer from allergies and respiratory issues. Many molds grow on rotten logs and fallen trees. Cutting down all of the trees will cause mold spores to contaminate the air.

This pipeline is taking away the sole reason that we moved into this neighborhood in the first place.to live in a peaceful, safe, private community. We also found out from a local realtor that our house price may drop by 50 thousand dollars or more. Because we are directly in a blast zone, this must be disclosed to any potential buyers. We don't want to live in a blast zone and now may never be able to sell our home.

The stress and anxiety over having a pipeline used for fracking in our backyard has caused many sleepless nights. This pipeline will be used to transport highly toxic gases for fracking. There have already been documented accidents of pipeline leaks. Fortunately, these leaks have occurred in rural areas. West Whiteland Chester County is such a densely populated area. A pipeline accident or leak could cause much devastation and destruction in this highly populated area. We walk to the library and mall both of which are in the blast zone. These businesses will suffer along with the schools located in the blast zone. West Whiteland Township in historic Chester County will never be the same. The environment we live in should take precedence over a dangerous pipeline used to make plastics to send to Europe.

Why put in a pipeline that could destroy so many lives? Please do not permit Sunoco to dig this pipeline in our backyard or anywhere in this area. (255)

I am a resident of Meadowbrook Manor in Exton, PA (West Whiteland Township), and I have some serious concerns about the proposed changes to the Mariner 2 pipelines through my neighborhood. Many of our homes are directly affected by the project, and all of our homes lie within the 1200 foot area of increased danger called the "Blast Zone." The biased information presented on short notice by the oil company does not satisfy our right-to-know that our safety and quality of life will be respected. The recent proposed changes would increase the negative impact to our community, including the following ways:

Damming and trenching through the floodway in a SFHA presents risks to wetlands, streams, and related ecosystems (e.g. trout runs), and may radically alter the drainage patterns of our neighborhood and the larger township water management plan.

Tree coverage in the wetlands by the Exton Mall would be removed as stated in the trenching plan. Trees are maintained as a buffer between our neighborhood and the Exton Mall commercial area, and restoration (if even possible) would take many years, leaving our neighborhood exposed to light and noise pollution.

Vibration, noise, and waste related to trenching would adversely affect neighbors and businesses. As an example, foundations and interior surfaces show damage in adjacent communities where trenching has occurred.

Further attention should be given to the public water well located directly adjacent to the trenching and boring location, just northeast of the MMCA park, to the south of Swedesford Road. I am not satisfied that the extent of the construction and post-construction hazards associated with the proposed pipeline, carrying new types of hazardous material, has been evaluated by the utility.

The entire construction area is located within a known region of karst geology, and regardless of construction method (boring, horizontal directional drilling, or open trenching), negative impacts and sinkhole creation affecting the community for decades to come, are a real possibility. I am not satisfied that the existing geological formations and alternative analyses have been studied adequately, and that the public has been sufficiently protected from these dangers based on the current design and construction methods.

It may be a logical conclusion that matching the path of an existing pipeline yields the fewest impacts, but the nature of the proposed materials transported are different from the existing pipeline, and they appear to pose a new threat to the safety and welfare of my family and friends, some of whom live a mere 100 feet from the proposed work.

I am asking you to consider reviewing the permit, the proposed modifications, and the lack of sufficient analysis and justification against alternative routes and further protections for residences in the blast zone

Finding an alternate path could avoid the abovementioned environmental issues and reduce the risk profile in case of leak or possible damage to the pipelines in this densely populated area. Please add my name to the list of concerned parties that want to ensure our local agencies respond to events in their jurisdictions that affect the lives of our residents.
