CHAIR:

That's all the committee members. Thank The purpose of this hearing is is to solicit you. input to the Draft State Water Plan. This hearing satisfies the requirements of the Water Resources Planning Act. Notice of this meeting was published in The Pennsylvania Bulletin on August 23rd, 2008. This meeting was also advertised in several area papers.

In order for everyone --- in order to give everyone an equal opportunity to comment this evening I would like to establish the following ground rules.

One, we will first call upon the witnesses who have pre-registered to testify at this evening's hearing as included in the schedule of witnesses. After hearing from these witnesses, I will provide any other interested party with the opportunity to testify as times allows.

Two, oral testimony is limited to ten 24 minutes for each witness.

Three, organizations are requested to

designate one witness to present testimony on its behalf.

Four, each witness is asked to submit three written copies of his testimony, his or her testimony, to aid in the transcribing of the hearing.

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Five, please state your name and address for the record prior to presenting your testimony.

Six, we would also appreciate your help in spelling names and terms that may not be generally familiar so that the transcript can be as accurate as possible.

In addition or in place of oral testimony presented at today's hearing, interested persons may submit written comments on this proposal. Comments should be addressed to the Department of Environmental Protection Water Planning Office, P.O. Box 2063, 18 | Harrisburg, PA 17105-2063. Comments can also be e-mailed to epstatewaterplan@state.pa.us. Contact sheets with this information are available from DEP staff persons.

All comments received at today's hearing, as well as written comments received prior to September 30th, 2008, will be considered by the Regional Water Resources Committee. An official

comment/response document will not be prepared for comments received at this hearing.

I would now like to call on our first witness. And I'm going to go with the folks who I don't know if they're here or not, but signed up. Todd --- is Todd Dillan here?

MR. DILLAN:

Yes.

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CHAIR ROHALL:

Todd, you have ten minutes. Okay.

MR. DILLAN:

Todd Dillan. Address is 933 Old Eden Union Road, Eden Valley, Pennsylvania. I'm the president of Dillan Well Drilling. I'm also on the 18 Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Groundwater Association. I'm certified by the National Groundwater Association in water well drilling and pump installation.

Four and a half million people in Pennsylvania use groundwater as their primary water source. This important resource needs to be protected against contamination entering in through improperly

constructed residential water wells which currently do not have any regulations. Pennsylvania also has an estimated 80 trillion gallons of groundwater residing underground in its aquifers This vast amount of water is enough to submerge the entire state at least eight foot deep if it was brought to the surface.

I would like to recommend if the committee could think this to be important to include this residential water well construction standard as part of one of their priority points in their plan, adding it to the three they already have. And I also would like to thank everyone for their time they spent working on this committee. I know you're taking time out of your busy schedules. Thank you.

CHAIR ROHALL:

Thank you, Todd. Ernie Smith.

MR. SMITH:

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Yes. My name is Ernie Smith and I am president of Parker Brothers Well Drilling in Hermitage, Pennsylvania, Mercer County. I'm a third generation owner.

I first want to thank the committee for the work they put into this and the interest that they have shown. But I, too, hope that the priority of it is moved up from where it is up to one of the major

Pennsylvania has the second highest number of ones. residential wells in the nation. The groundwater resources of Pennsylvania are important water resources worthy of protection. And Pennsylvania is only one of two states in the United States that has no legislation or protection for residential groundwater. And because of its importance we'd like to see the priority moved up on your list. Thank you.

CHAIR:

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Thank you. Paul Jobe.

MR. JOBE:

My name is Paul Jobe from 107 Jobe Road, Greensburg, Pennsylvania, Westmoreland County. I'd just like to regulate --- or get some regulation for well protection heads and see if --- is there any 16 coding in for liquid manure? Because right now down in the conservation district they're pasturing 100 feet for pastures and putting trees in for watersheds, and putting causeways in for sediment control. But I don't see no regulations for liquid manure certain footage from creek lines and watersheds.
