<u>Introductions</u>

Chairman Weston opened the meeting and those in attendance introduced themselves.

Comments from the public

None.

CWPA Recommendation Discussion: Technical Subcommittee Meeting

Preston Luitweiler provided a summary of the Technical Subcommittee Meeting with Jan Bowers giving an overview of each of the 15 watershed areas under consideration for designation.

VOTE by the Full Statewide Committee to Recommend CWPA Watersheds to the DEP Secretary.

The Committee voted unanimously on a motion that stated that several watersheds warrant continuing review and attention and shall be placed on a watch list. Further consultation will occur with the respective regional committees and the Department will report back to the Statewide Committee concerning developments in those watersheds during 2011. The watersheds placed on the special watch list include the following:

- Little Lehigh Ck (Delaware)
- Brodhead Creek (Delaware)
- Sugar Creek (Upper/Middle Susquehanna)
- Spring Creek (Upper/Middle Susquehanna)

Tim Weston stated he no longer has a conflict of interest in the Marsh Creek/Rock Creek watersheds because the litigation he was involved with has ended. He asked if anyone would have concerns with him voting. No concern was expressed.

The Committee voted unanimously on a motion that stated that pursuant to Section 3111(d) of the Water Resources Planning Act, and in response to the recommendations made by the Ohio Basin Regional Committee and the Potomac River Basin Regional Committee, the Statewide Water Resources Committee approves and recommends to the Secretary of Environmental Protection the designation of the following watersheds in the State Water Plan as critical water planning areas for the development of a critical area resource plan:

- Laurel Hill Creek (Ohio River Basin)
- Back Creek (Ohio River Basin)
- Marsh Creek and Rock Creek (Potomac River Basin)

Carol Collier mentioned that in many potential CWPA watersheds, the dewatering and diversion of water via wastewater collection and treatment systems that is part of the problem. Act 537 planning does not address this resource concern. She recommended that the Statewide Committee further examine overall issue of diversion of water out of watersheds through wastewater systems.

New Nominations

Dave Jostenski reported that the Department will still accept watershed nominations from outside groups for Critical Water Planning Areas. However due to staffing constraints DEP may not act on them until staffing resources become available.

Update on Watershed Management Plans

Dave Jostenski gave an update on the ongoing watershed management plans in Laurel Hill Creek, Back Creek and Marsh/Rock Creek. DEP has funding for these plans and is working with USGS and Interstate Commission Potomac River Basin (ICPRB) in the development of these plans. These plans have been following the process for development of a Critical Area Resource Plan.

Water Conservation / Technical Assistance Center Subcommittee Update

Jon Meade gave an update on the efforts of the PA Environmental Council to establish a non-profit Water Conservation/Technical Assistance Center. The Center will also be called Save Water PA and has numerous confirmed board members. A business plan has been developed and non profit status has been obtained.
