25 Pa. Code Chapter 105

Statutory Authority

- Sections 5, 7, 10, 11 and 17 of the Dam Safety and Encroachments Act (32 P.S. §§ 693.5, 693.7, 693.10, 693.11 and 693.17);
- Sections 5 and 402 of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.5 and 691.402);
- Sections 302 and 402 of the Flood Plain Management Act (32 P.S. §§ 679.302 and 679.402);

- Clarify and better organize existing requirements
- Incorporate existing practices
- Make updates consistent with current scientific and technical knowledge and good engineering practice
- Add new/revise existing sections
- Add new supporting definitions and revise existing definitions
- Delete or update obsolete requirements and references
- Correct typographical errors

Section 105.12 Waiver of permit requirements

- Adds six new waivers under Subsection (a):
 - (17) Streambank fencing conservation practice associated with crop production (i.e. grazing)
 - (18) Passive, low impact, and non-motorized recreational activities
 - (19) Elevated boardwalks in wetlands for educational and interpretive trails
 - (20) Emergency water withdrawal for agricultural and fire protection
 - (21) Temporary environmental testing, monitoring or investigative activities
 - (22) Temporary mats and pads in wetlands

<u>Updated Compensatory Mitigation Requirements Framework</u>

- Consistent with the Department's authority
- Consistent with Federal mitigation requirements
- Options for:
 - Permittee responsible
 - Mitigation bank credit purchase
 - Accept payments into in-lieu fee program
- Time and cost savings for applicants
- Permitting efficiencies
- Greater environmental benefits
- Consistency with current scientific understanding of ecosystem restoration

- Time and cost savings to the regulated community and DEP
 - Increased regulatory clarity
 - Improved quality of applications
 - More projects eligible for waivers (no permits or permit fees)
 - More efficient process for environmentally beneficial projects
- No new or increased permit or registration fees



Department Recommendation

The Department recommends the Board adopt the proposed regulation. The Department also recommends a 60-day public comment period that includes holding public hearings.











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
