Statutory Requirements

Radiation Protection Act

- Act 147 of 1984 (as amended in 2007 and 2014)
- Requires the EQB to "set reasonable annual fees for the registration of radiation sources and the licensing of radiation source users."

Radon Certification Act

- Act 43 of 1987
- Requires DEP to establish a fee schedule to cover the costs of certification programs for radon testing and mitigation

RP Program Activities Funded by Fees

Chapter 218 - Radiation-Producing Machine & Radioactive Materials Fees

- Radiation-Producing Machines
 - X-ray devices, Accelerators, Vendors
 - Fee schedule last revised in 2009
- Radioactive Materials (RAM)
 - Specific Licenses, General Licenses, Reciprocity
 - Fee schedule last revised in 2017
- Decommissioning / Clean-up
 - Fee schedule last revised in 2017



RP Program Activities Funded by Fees

Chapter 240 - Radon Fees

Radon

- Testers, Mitigators, Laboratories
- Fee schedule last revised in 2017




Reason for Proposed Fees

- Fees from radiation-producing machine and radioactive material users, and radon testers, mitigators and laboratories are the major source of revenue for their respective programs.
- Program and personnel costs have continued to increase since the last fee increases in 2009 and 2017.
- Current fees will be unable to fully support the radiationproducing machines and radioactive materials programs.
 - No increase needed for the radon program.
- This proposed rulemaking will increase fee revenue to sufficiently cover program costs, as directed by Act 147.




Current Radiation-Producing Machines

Proposed Fee Changes

Radiation-Producing Machines

- 30% increase necessary to sustain the program through 2027 – increased costs and to replace X-ray survey equipment
- Move chiropractor fees from "other" category to dentist, podiatrist and veterinarian category

Proposed Fee Changes

Radioactive Materials


- 10% increase necessary to sustain the program through 2027
- Full cost includes DEP hourly fee increase from \$225 to \$275




Proposed Fees
