#### **Committee sought other options**

# Dog's fate causes uproar Inmate

Animal Resource Center euthanized animal after biting incident

EYERS GROVE — Two Animal Resource Center workers were walking dogs on a night in early January when one of the animals, a 1-year-old pit bull mix, began biting at a shel-

The other worker came to her aid, but the dog, Aspen, jumped on that woman, biting her multiple times. By the end of the month, the no-kill shelter had euthanized the male

That angered some in the local community who work with dogs. They described Aspen as an otherwise sweet dog, and said shelter officials rushed to judgment. Multiple people who run dog-training businesses had offered to work with the dog, critics of the kill say.

In an email she wrote on behalf of the shelter board, President Mary Sult called the decision to put down the dog "heartbreaking" but necessary. She said Aspen was evaluated by two professionals and declared dangerous.

The incident ignited an online debate about the overall running of ARC, the main dog and cat shelter in Columbia County. It also has led to a closer look at the events leading to Aspen's demise.

#### **Manager left bleeding**

Even those present for Aspen's biting of shelter Manager Tori Johnson disagree on the specifics of what occurred.

Shelter worker Taylor Golder was walking Aspen the night of Jan. 3, she said. Meanwhile, Johnson was walking another dog.

Asnen "seemed to be getting overstip lated and turned to nip and pull at my pant leg," Golder wrote in an email to the Press Enterprise. "He did not try to latch. He then was jumping around snapping his mouth around me from the overstimulating.

In Golder's recounting, Johnson put the leash of the dog she was walking around a bench, and approached Aspen from behind.

"I never stated that I needed help and I wasn't saying anything during this time since I was remaining calm to calm him down," Golder continued. Johnson grabbed the leash from Golder's hands, Golder said. Because it was dark, the dog did not hear or see the leash exchange. That's when the dog turned and tried to snap at Johnson repeatedly, Golder said.

"This is where I believe that his overstimulation turned to fear aggression, and Aspen was trying to protect himself," Golder said.

#### 'Visibly shaken'

Johnson's account differs. She said she saw Aspen biting and tugging at Golder's clothing, "then making contact with her fin-

So Johnson said she tried stepping in to

"Upon taking over the leash, Aspen started to exhibit some behaviors that included jumping and biting at my clothing/face. While attempting to secure him safely, he bit my arm, legs, and finger, firmly grasping my thumb without immediately releasing it," Johnson wrote in an email to Press Enterprise.

'Despite successfully securing him, Aspen

# tells judge booze is his 'best friend'

Repeat offender, 29, gets two more years of state prison time for fifth DUI conviction

DANVILLE — A Milton man doing state prison time on his fifth drunk driving conviction including one in Montour County told a judge how alcohol has been "his best friend" since he was a teenager.

Neal Lilley Jr., 29, described a series of personal tragedies including a brother's selfinflicted gunshot wound and a history of alcoholism in his family that led to his arrests and incarceration.

"I turned to the bottle. And here I am," he said during a resentencing hearing on Monday in which he received two more years tacked onto his overall state prison term of 29 months to seven years.

Lilley was charged by State Police with driving while impaired by both marijuana and alcohol along Continental Boulevard in Anthony Township on Oct. 15, 2021.

He was given a chance at recovery and to avoid more jail time by entering the county's treatment court program, essentially a "getout-of-jail-free" opportunity, Assistant District Attorney Ray Kessler said.

But Lilley was arrested again two weeks later for driving drunk, this time in Union County where he received a lengthy state prison sentence as a repeat offender.

#### 'I'm tired of being locked up'

Montour County Public Defender Megan Moro argued Lilley should not receive any additional prison time, but rather a concurrent sentence with Union County that would offer him a better chance at recovery and eventual release.

Lilley said he has a minor child to support and has worked in the past as a welder and in the fast-food industry.

"I'm tired. I'm tired of being locked up and

I need help," he told the court. But Kessler said a consecutive sentence

# Hamas releases three gaunt hostages

DEIR AL-BALAH, Gaza Strip (AP) — Hamas- hostages in Hamas captivity. "President Trump led militants released three gaunt, frail-looking Israeli hostages and Israel freed nearly 200 Palestinian prisoners Saturday in the latest exchange of a ceasefire agreement that has paused 16 months of war in Gaza.

The hostages' condition and scenes of Hamas forcing them to speak in a handover ceremony sparked outrage in Israel and could increase pressure on Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to extend the ceasefire beyond its current

Netanyahu has signaled he would resume the war, even if that meant leaving dozens of completely agreed with me: We will do everything to return all the hostages, but Hamas will not be there," Netanyahu said after the

Before a crowd of hundreds, armed militants led Eli Sharabi, 52; Ohad Ben Ami, 56; and Or Levy, 34, onto a stage to make statements before handing them over to the Red Cross. The three civilian men were among about 250 people taken during the Hamas-led attack on Israel on Oct. 7, 2023, that sparked the war.

The joy of some Israelis watching their release turned to shock and tears when they saw their

emaciated state. The men appeared in poorer condition than the 18 hostages previously set free.

Later Saturday, Israel released 183 Palestinian prisoners, some also appearing gaunt and weak. The Red Crescent said seven were taken to hospitals. Many Palestinians released during the ceasefire have appeared emaciated and pale, and have alleged abuses in Israeli custody.

It was the fifth exchange since the ceasefire began Jan. 19.

The Red Cross said it was "increasingly concerned about the conditions surrounding release operations" and urged all parties to ensure releases are dignified and private.



#### Lebanon forms government

BEIRUT (AP) — Lebanon's new prime minister has formed the country's first full-fledged government since 2022.

President Joseph Aoun announced Saturday he had accepted the resignation of the former caretaker government and signed a decree with new Prime Minister Nawaf Salam to form the new government. Salam's cabinet of 24 ministers, split evenly between Christian and Muslim sects, comes as Lebanon is scrambling to rebuild its battered southern region.

#### Wildfires spur curfews

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Chilean President Gabriel Boric has issued state of emergency decrees for two regions in the center and south of the country due to raging wildfires.

He said the measure on Saturday for Nuble and Maule is aimed at saving forests, fields, homes and human life. Boric told a press conference at the presidential palace he has "reasons to believe that a large part of the fires that affect the Araucanía area today (south of capital Santiago) are deliberate." He said all affected regions will be under curfews to allow authorities to tackle possible criminal acts.

#### **Leaders call for ceasefire**

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — Leaders from eastern and southern Africa have called for an immediate and unconditional ceasefire in eastern Congo, where Rwanda-backed rebels are threatening to overthrow the Congolese government.

The rebels seized Goma, the biggest city in eastern Congo, following fighting that left nearly 3,000 dead and hundreds of thousands displaced.

#### Eight injured in plant fire

MOSCOW (AP) — At least eight people were injured after a fire at a former electrical plant building in Moscow, Russian state media

The Emergencies Ministry said more than 90 people were rescued on Saturday from the upper floors of the building, and more than 120 evacuated on their own. Eight people were injured, with three requiring hospital treatment, according to Russian state news agency Tass.

#### Rescuers search landslide

BEIJING (AP) - Chinese rescuers are searching for some 30 people after a landslide in southwestern Sichuan province buried 10 houses.

The Ministry of Emergency Management deployed hundreds of rescuers including firefighters following the landslide Saturday in Junlian county. State broadcaster CCTV said two people were pulled out alive and about 200 others evacuated.

#### Thousands rally in protest

MUNICH, Germany (AP) — More than 200,000 protesters have demonstrated in Munich against far-right extremism ahead of the German general election.

The far-right, anti-immigrant Alternative for Germany party is in second place in recent polls and has prompted widespread protests across the country before voters cast their ballots on Feb. 23. Saturday's protest at Munich's Theresienwiese brought a significantly larger crowd than expected. The police estimated the crowd at 200,000 people, according to reports, but the event's organizer estimated it could be up to 320,000.

#### **Ukraine confirms offensive**

KYIV, Ukraine (AP) — Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has confirmed a new Ukrainian offensive in Russia's Kursk region and said North Korean troops are fighting alongside Russian forces there.

#### Earthquakes, tremors persist

ATHENS, Greece (AP) - Schools on four Greek islands will remain closed through next week as earthquakes continue to rattle the region.

More than 800 tremors of magnitude 3 and over have been recorded on the tourist islands of Santorini, Amorgos, Anafi and Ios since Feb. 1, triggering an exodus of most of Santorini's 16,000 residents as well as visitors. Even though the earthquake activity has somewhat abated, the Athens Institute of Geodynamics says 11 tremors of at least magnitude 4 hit on Saturday.

#### Sony outage enrages gamers

ROME (AP) — Sony's PlayStation Network (PSN) is experiencing a major outage across the world, leaving tens of thousands of gamers unable to access online services, stores and

According to Downdetector, an outage tracker, users started to report issues with PSN late Friday.

#### **Baltics leave Soviet grid**

VILNIUS, Lithuania (AP) — The flow of electricity between the Baltic countries of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania and Russia has been officially severed.

Officials switched off the Soviet-era grid's transmission lines on Saturday as they prepared to join the rest of Europe on Sunday. Coming more than three decades after the collapse of the Soviet Union, Saturday's event ended the Baltics' final ties to oil- and gas-rich Russia.

#### Canada, Philippines eye pact

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The Canadian ambassador says his country and the Philippines are in the final stages of negotiating a

key defense pact that will allow their forces to hold larger military drills.

Canada has been reinforcing its military presence in the Indo-Pacific as the Philippines faces an increasingly assertive China that claims the South China Sea virtually in its entirety.

#### Royal couple announce birth

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Sweden's Prince Carl Philip and Princess Sofia have announced the birth of their fourth child, a daughter.

The young princess's name and photograph have not been released. She was born Friday in Stockholm. Prince Carl Philip is the son of Sweden's King Carl XVI Gustaf and fourth in the line of succession. The king is Sweden's head of state, but his duties are ceremonial and he holds no political power.

#### Flu suspected in zoo deaths

NEW YORK (AP) — Zoo operators in New York City say at least three and possibly up to 15 bird have died of avian flu.

The Wildlife Conservation Society says three ducks at the Queens Zoo died after contracting the virus, and lab tests are pending on three ducks and nine wild birds that died at the Bronx Zoo after possible exposure. On Friday. state officials ordered bird markets in the metropolitan area to close for a week after seven cases of avian flu were detected.

#### All 10 bodies recovered

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — Authorities say the remains of all 10 people killed when their small plane crashed into ice on the Bering Sea have been recovered.

The Nome Volunteer Fire Department made the announcement on its Facebook page Saturday afternoon. Recovery crews had been racing to recover the bodies before a winter storm was expected to hit the region. The Bering Air single-engine turboprop plane was traveling from Unalakleet to the hub community of Nome when it disappeared Thursday afternoon. It was found the next day after an extensive search with all nine passengers and the pilot dead.

#### Three convicted in thefts

Three Pennsylvania men were convicted of theft this week in federal court for their part in stealing millions of dollars in sports memorabilia and artwork over the last 20 years, according to a report on PennLive.

Nicholas Dombek, 54, of Thronhust; Damien Boland, 48, of Moscow; and Joseph Atsus, 48, of Roaring Brook were all convicted of numerous federal offenses including theft of major artwork Friday following a four-week trial in federal court, according a news release issued by the Department of Justice.

The three were part of a larger ring that stole two contracts signed by early-1900s pitcher Christy Mathewson, artwork by Andy Warhol and Jackson Pollock, numerous items that once belonged to Yogi Berra worth more than \$1 million, three antique firearms worth more than \$1 million, as well as numerous trophies, championship rings, belts and other memorabilia, according to the DOJ.

The items were stolen from museums across the United States but most were in Pennsylva-

nia, New York and New Jersey.

In many cases, the stolen memorabilia were melted down into raw metal discs or bars and sold to metal fences in New York City, the DOJ said. Dombrek was also accused of burning a painting by Jasper Cropsey worth \$500,000 in an effort to destroy evidence that could be used against him at trial, according to the DOJ. All three men face a maximum of five years

# The oldest rhino in the U.S. has died

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) The oldest rhinoceros in the United States has died at a Tennessee zoo. Dolly was 56 years old.

In a social media post Thursday, Zoo Knoxville said Dolly was euthanized after her mobility declined significantly in recent days despite receiving old-age medical care for some time. The decision was made by Dolly's veterinary team with the help of specialists from the University of Tennessee College of Veterinary Medicine.

The experts determined there were no treatment options left that could maintain Dolly's quality of life, the zoo

# Academy Museum display focuses on color

LOS ANGELES — In the hit movie "Wicked," those famous magical shoes are silver. But if you want to see them in all their ruby-red glory from "The Wizard of Oz," there's no place like home – their current home, that is, at the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures in Los Angeles.

There, Dorothy's shoes, worn by Judy Garland, are now on display as part of a sweeping exhibit on the history of color in cinema. It's a history in which the sequined slippers play a key role.

While the 1900 novel by Frank L. Baum described them as silver, filmmakers in 1939 wanted to pack as much color as possible into the scene where Dorothy steps from sepia-toned Kansas into the shimmering color of the Land of Oz, where Glinda gives her the shoes off the feet of the Wicked Witch of the East. They were showing off a new technology: Tech-

The exhibit, "Color in Motion: Chromatic Explorations of Cinema," running through July 13, is timely not only because everything Oz is new again.

It also highlights the largely unsung role that women played in the development of color in Hollywood, not only on screen but off, where labor-intensive jobs like handcoloring and stenciling gave them a foothold in a maledominated industry.

There's also a fanciful interactive installation where your own body creates cinematic explosions of color, on

#### People always ask to see the shoes

Those glistening slippers nestled against a wall — rather unobtrusively, given their iconic status — began their life as white silk pumps. "The Wizard of Oz" costume designer Adrian (known by his first name) dved them red and embellished them with nearly 5,000 sequins.

# **Animal Resource Center has** lost control of Facebook page

EYERS GROVE — As a shelter faces questions over its treatment of a pit bull that bit the shelter's manager, the Animal Resource Center is also battling to take back control of its Facebook page.

In a statement written by President Mary Sult, the ARC board says the shelter's social media page is now under the control of a "previous employee or affiliate" who will not give the shelter access to the account.

Its last post, on Feb. 1, detailed the circumstances of Aspen's euthanization. Since Feb. 2, the shelter has been unable to post to the

The board claims one of the women interviewed for this story has denied it control of the shelter account, though the statement did not say who.

"Meta is currently investigating the situation and has provided ARC information on this person, which has been passed along to the police," the statement reads. ARC says it believes it's been the victim of a crime, and has faced "unjust judgment, harassment, and bullying based on misinformation being maliciously spread with the purpose of defaming and discrediting ARC as an organization.'

Meanwhile, Kate Magni told a reporter ARC's lawyers had contacted her and threatened her with legal action, believing she was

the one who had locked the shelter out of its social media. Magni denied having any connection to the Facebook lockout.

"It's a confusing letter but they gave me 24 hours to provide Mary Sult with the Facebook login and password (which I don't have because that's not how FB works when you manage pages) or they will be filing a report with the PSP (Pennsylvania State Police) to have me charged ... I believe this is just another attempt to bully me or retaliate as I imagine they know about the article or are feeling pressure from the posts on social media," she concluded.



# Don't try this diet at home, folks

AMA Cardiology published a case on Jan. 22 that might put followers of the carnivore diet off their

The subject arrived at a Tampa, Florida, hospital with yellow oozing nodes on his palms, elbows and soles of his feet, the New York Post reported.

He told doctors he was following a diet consisting of entire sticks of butter, 6 to 9 pounds of cheese and hamburger patties daily.

He said his overall health had improved — he had lost weight and gained energy and cognitive functioning.

But the painless ooze had started nearly a month

Blood tests revealed his cholesterol level was more than 1,000 mg/dL — about five times what is considered

He was diagnosed with xanthelasma, in which excess lipids ooze from the blood

The report didn't reveal the man's fate.



• Longtime NFL player and coach **Dick** Jauron, who led the Chicago Bears to the playoffs and was voted AP coach of the year in 2001, died Saturday. He was 74.

The Bears confirmed his death, which came one day before Philadelphia — where Jauron briefly served as an assistant to current Chiefs coach Andy Reid played Kansas City in the Super Bowl

in New Orleans. Jauron was a two-sport star at Yale in the early 1970s, and he was drafted by both the Detroit Lions in the NFL draft and the St. **Louis Cardinals** League Baseball amateur draft. He ultimately made football his lifelong pursuit, beginning with five seasons as a defensive back in Detroit and three more with Cincinnati before his retirement in 1980.

NEW ORLEANS — Patrick Mahomes, Travis Kelce and the Kansas City Chiefs are pursuing history and a few of Taylor Swift's records.

Saquon Barkley, Jalen Hurts and the

Philadelphia Eagles stand in their way. The Chiefs (17-2) will try to become the first team to win three straight Super Bowls when they face the Eagles (17-3) tonight in the Superdome.

It's a rematch from two years ago when Hurts nearly led the Eagles to a championship only to watch Mahomes snatch it away by rallying Kansas City to a 38-35 win on Harrison Butker's 27-yard field goal with 8 seconds left.

Mahomes lifted the Chiefs to an overtime win against San Francisco in another Super Bowl rematch last year. Now, they're poised for a three-peat, a word coach Andy Reid doesn't use much.

"I think the only time I've heard him say it is to the media whenever y'all ask him about it," Mahomes said. "He's very locked in on just, 'How can we be great with our cadence today at practice?' so that's just the stuff that Coach Reid fo-

Reid won more games than any coach in franchise history during his 14 seasons in Philadelphia but couldn't win the big one, going 1-4 in NFC championship games and losing a Super Bowl to the Patriots. He went right to Kansas City after the Eagles fired him following the 2012 season and has built a dynasty thanks to Mahomes, Kelce, Chris Jones and others.

# Commissioners weighing changes

he Pennsylvania Board of Game Commissioners recently convened in Harrisburg to deliberate on several pivotal issues affecting hunters, conservationists and outdoor enthusiasts across the state. The meeting encompassed a range of topics, from proposed modifications to the elk license application process to significant land acquisitions aimed at expanding state game lands.

#### Elk license application process

One of the most notable discussions centered on the elk license application system. The Board has given

preliminary approval to a series of changes designed to streamline and enhance the application experience for hunters. These proposals are slated for final consideration in April. 1. Manda-

tory hunting

license purchase before application: Currently, individuals can apply for an elk license without holding a general hunting license, only purchasing one if drawn. The proposed change would require applicants to acquire a general hunting license before submitting bull elk tag in their lifetime. an elk tag application. This aims to ensure that only committed

ing process. 2. Simplification of application requirements: To reduce redundancy, the Game Commission proposes eliminating applicants needing to provide their Social Security number or hunter ID during the elk license application. Since this information is already captured during the general hunting license purchase, its re-entry

is deemed unnecessary. 3. Modernization of drawing description: The language describing the elk license drawing process is set to be updated. Historically, paper applications were manually drawn from a rotating barrel. Today, selections are made electronically. The proposed update will reflect this modernized process.

4. Elimination of mandatory orientation program: The current requirement for successful applicants to attend an orientation program is proposed for removal, as such programs are no longer

5. Limiting nonresident elk licenses: To address concerns about the increasing number of nonresident hunters receiving elk tags — rising to 13% in recent years — the Commission proposes capping nonresident elk licenses

at 10% annually. 6. Lifetime limit on bull elk tags: A significant change under consideration is limiting hunters to one bull elk tag in their lifetime. Hunters who draw a bull elk license can reapply after five years. Under the new proposal, effective Jan. 1, successful applicants for an antlered elk would be ineligible to apply for a bull tag again. Those who have drawn a bull tag before this date can still apply for a second tag using accumulated bonus points but cannot submit new applications post-2026. Bonus points for hunters drawing a bull tag after Jan. 1, apply only to antlerless elk drawings moving forward.

These proposed changes aim to create a more efficient, fair and modernized elk hunting experience in Pennsylvania.

#### Agricultural deer control program

The Board also gave preliminary approval to four modifications to the agricultural deer control permit program, commonly known as the "Red Tag" program. This program assists farmers in managing deer populations that cause crop damage by allowing hunters to harvest additional antlerless deer on their properties during extended seasons.

1. Simplified ownership certification: Applicants only need to certify that they are the owner or lessee of the agricultural interest affected by deer damage and that the hunting rights are to be covered by the permit. Previously, providing a deed or lease agree-

#### It happened in ... 1923

The first bull elk season was held in Pennsylvania. During this season, hunters could not conduct organized drives for Elk, which was the most common way of pursuing big game. Only bulls with four or more points to at least one antler were legal to harvest. During this season, 23 legal bulls were taken.

ment was mandatory.

2. Removal of permit limit per property: The existing restriction limiting hunters to four "Red Tag" permits per property is proposed for elimination, allowing for more flexible deer man-

3. Extended hunting periods: The permissible period for harvesting antlerless deer with a "Red Tag" would be extended, maintaining a brief closure during the peak fawning season in late spring and early summer. This change would more than double the number of days hunters can utilize these permits, including overlaps with established deer hunting seasons.

4. Regulated use of sporting arms: During overlaps with established hunting seasons, hunters would be limited to using the sporting arms permitted in those seasons. For instance, only bows and crossbows could be used during archery season until tney overlap with muzzleloader

These proposed adjustments aim to provide farmers with more effective tools to manage deer populations and mitigate agricultural damage.

#### Steel targets at select shooting ranges

In an effort to enhance the shooting experience and improve safety, the Game Commission is considering adding steel targets at specific rifle and handgun ranges. Steel targets offer shooters immediate auditory feedback upon a successful hit, reducing the need to travel downrange to check paper targets. This enhances safety by minimizing downrange movement and reduces maintenance and cleanup costs associated with paper targets and backboards. Only steel targets installed by the Game Commission would be permitted; shooters could not bring personal steel targets to the ranges.

#### **License holdings** in WMUs 5C and 5D

To better manage deer populations in specific areas, the Board

preliminarily agreed to increase the number of antlerless licenses a hunter can hold simultaneously in Wildlife Management Units (WMUs) 5C and 5D. Currently, hunters statewide can possess up to six active antlerless licenses at a time. The proposed change would raise this limit to 15 in WMUs 5C and 5D, allowing hunters more opportunities to harvest additional antlerless deer where population control is most

**FARR'S FOOTPRINTS** 

#### **Expanding state** game lands

Land acquisition was another major topic on the agenda of the meeting. The Game Commission has been working to increase public access to hunting lands, securing several new parcels that will benefit hunters, hikers, and wildlife enthusiasts. Among the most significant acquisitions

discussed: 1. Centre County expansion: A large tract of land adjacent to State Game Lands 33 is in negotiation. This land would provide crucial habitat for deer, turkey, and bear.

2. Western Pa. developments: Several smaller land purchases are under review to expand access points and improve habitat in the western part of the state.

3. Public access improvements: Commissioners also discussed

investing in improved signage, parking areas and habitat management efforts on existing game

If finalized, these acquisitions will contribute to the Game Commission's goal of ensuring hunters have ample opportunities to enjoy public hunting lands.

#### **Updates on CWD**

The Board provided updates on Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), a persistent concern for Pennsylvania's deer population. Game Commission biologists reported on the latest testing results, management strategies and containment efforts.

Some key points from the discussion included:

1. Expansion of disease Management Areas (DMAs): CWDpositive cases have been detected in new regions, prompting expansions of DMAs to contain the spread.

2. Increased testing efforts: The Commission encourages hunters to submit harvested deer for testing, particularly in high-risk

3. Potential regulation changes: Further restrictions on transporting deer carcasses from CWD-affected areas are being considered to limit disease spread.

#### **HSH** program report

The commissioners strongly praised the Hunter's Sharing the Harvest (HSH) program, which allows hunters to donate venison to those in need. The 2024 season has already seen a substantial number of deer donations, with thousands of pounds of venison distributed to food banks across the state. Hunters are encouraged to continue participating in this vital program.

#### What's next

The board will reconvene in April when final votes on several of these proposals will occur. Hunters, anglers and conservationists are encouraged to stay informed and provide input on issues that impact the future of Pennsylvania's outdoor traditions.

Public comment opportunities remain open for those interested in voicing their opinions. Whether it's the elk license overhaul, land expansion efforts, or chronic wasting disease management, these decisions will shape Pennsylvania's hunting landscape for years to come.

North Centre Township PFAS Investigation: North Centre Township, Columbia County

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P.S. §§6020.101-6020.1305), has initiated a Prompt-Interim Response at the North Centre Township PFAS Investigation Site. This response has been initiated pursuant to Sections 501(a) and 505(b) of HSCA (35 P.S. §§6020.501(a) and 6020- 505(b)). The site is located at: North Centre Township, Columbia County, PA.

The North Centre Township PFAS Investigation is located in an area within a radial distance of .5 mile around a public water supply well located at the Brookside Village Mobile Home Park (Brookside). Upon detection of perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) above federal drinking water standards in the public drinking water supply at Brookside, DEP initiated a sampling program to determine whether private supply wells within the investigation area are impacted. Sampling of private properties in the area have indicated impacts at varying levels to residential supply wells.

The North Centre Township PFAS Investigation to date consists of the testing of private supply wells within the study area to identify those having PFAS concentrations above federal drinking water standards. The objectives of the investigation are to identify impacted private wells, provide an immediate alternative source of drinking water evaluate alternatives for interim mitigation, identify the extent of contamination, and trace potential sources of the contamination. PFAS compounds have been associated with negative impacts to human health and present a danger to public health and the environment. PFAS has been found to be present in groundwater utilized as a drinking water source at the site and is potentially present in soils on properties where historic permitted biosolids application has occurred.

Interim mitigation response alternatives to be evaluated by DEP include 1) no action, 2) informing the property owners of the contamination and providing information on in-home treatment options, 3) providing bottled water as an alternative drinking water source, and 4) providing in-home treatment systems. The proposed prompt interim alternative is a combination of 3 and 4, with the provision of bottled water as an immediate mitigation followed by installation of an in-home treatment system. This combination is the interim option that is most protective of human health that is currently both available and implementable. Additional alternatives may be considered when evaluating a final remedy.

Upon receipt of laboratory analytical data showing concentrations of regulated PFAS compounds above federal drinking water standards, DEP has been arranging the delivery of bottled drinking water as an immediate alternative drinking water source. A General Technical Assistance Contractor has been requisitioned to assist DEP with sampling, treatment system design and installation, and investigation of potentia

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences has pledged to help its members and the broader film community recover.

Here's everything you need to know about this vear's show:

#### March 2

The Academy Awards will be held on Sunday, March 2, at the Dolby Theatre in Los Angeles. The show, to be broadcast live by ABC, is to begin at 7 p.m.

For the first time, the Oscars will be streamed live on Hulu. You can also watch via Hulu Live TV, YouTubeTV. AT&T TV and FuboTV. With authentication from your provider, you can watch on ABC.com and the ABC app.

#### Who's hosting

Conan O'Brien is hosting the Academy Awards for the first time. O'Brien, the late night host turned podcaster and occasional movie star, said upon the announcement: "America demanded it and now it's happening: Taco Bell's new Cheesy Chalupa Supreme. In other news, I'm hosting the Oscars."

#### Wildfires

The wildfires that consumed large parts of Los Angeles in early January led some to call for the cancellation of the Academy Awards. The academy twice postponed the announcement of nominations but never pushed the March 2 date of the ceremony. Academy leaders argued the show must go ahead, for their economic impact on Los Angeles and as a symbol

Still, the fires curtailed much of the usual frothiness of Hollywood's awards season. The film academy canceled its annual nominees luncheon.

O'Brien's Pacific Palisades home survived but his family has been unable to go back to it. O'Brien's assistant and podcast cohost Sona Movsesian lost her home.

"I know so many people who lost their homes and I'm just, was ridiculously lucky," O'Brien said. "So we want to make sure that that show reflects what's happening and that we put a light on the right people in the right way.

#### **ROSES AND THORNS**

ROSE: For most of us, advanced math might as well be Mars. It's so far beyond our grasp, we just know we're not going.

But it now seems possible someday, perhaps in this century, humans will, indeed, travel to and explore the Red Planet. And they will get there because of people who do understand advanced math.

People like Danville Area High School senior Julian Hardin.

Thursday he took a test he hopes will earn him an invitation to the International Mathematics Olympiad. He earned his shot at representing the U.S. by scoring in the top 5% of math students nationwide who took the qualifying test.

How did Julian get so good at something that confounds so many of us?

"Hard work and dedication to his craft," says Devin Knorr, a Danville High math teacher.

It's often said you have to put in 10,000 hours to get really good at something. Julian puts in two to three hours on school days and six to seven on weekends preparing for the qualifying exam.

Whether he wins a spot in the Olympiad or just comes close, he's clearly a young man going places maybe Mars, or at least figuring out the complex math that someday will help others get there.

ROSE: Congratulations to Attorney Tony McDonald, whose nomination to a judgeship here was approved last week by the Pennsylvania

McDonald's 30 years practicing law have included more than a few appointments as solicitor to local government boards, including the Columbia County Commissioners.

This means he's often been called on to explain issues or problems we consider news. In our many dealings with him, our reporters have always found him to be patient, polite and as candid as the situation allows.

No doubt he will bring those same qualities to his new job.

THORN: The fatal midair collision in Washington two weeks ago exposed the tragic ineptitude of government bureaucracy.

After the crash, the Associated Press looked at a database that catalogs complaints by airline pilots about the nation's air traffic control systems. What the AP found were dozens of complaints over the past 20 years

about near-misses and collision warnings on the approach to Reagan National Airport. One aviator even called Reagan the nation's most dangerous airport.

But even though these complaints were gathered and cataloged by the Federal Aviation Administration, the AP reported, "It is not clear if federal authorities were aware of such concerns or took any steps to mitigate the risks."

How could the FAA not have been "aware of such concerns?" They were in a database it compiled.

Sixty-seven U.S. citizens died because the FAA did nothing about the very problem it had documented. Only after the lives had been lost did the FAA pause almost all helicopter traffic near Reagan.

According to reports, the new administration in Washington is whirling through some federal agencies like the cartoon Tasmanian Devil. You may not agree with the way it's being done; the delegation of so much authority to Elon Musk, whom no one elected, is worrisome.

But when an agency responsible for the safety of airline passengers spends decades compiling a list of safety complaints it's clear something needs to be done.

ROSE: Say this for Bloomsburg goldsmith Terry Van Dyke: He doesn't just take a hint; he does something about it.

The longtime town business owner recently presented Bloomsburg's council with a petition expressing dissatisfaction with downtown parking rates and rules. It was signed by almost 3,900 people, which is a huge number


in a town that counts only 13,000 residents. The petition asks council to reconsider its parking rates for downtown lots and Main Street. "We need easy and affordable parking," Van Dyke told our


Bloomsburg reporter, M.J. Mahon. Parking, it seems, is Bloomsburg's unsolvable

Van Dyke said he circulated the petition after a comment by Mayor Justin Hummel kind of brought him up short. He said Hummel told him, "I don't like it when people who are not involved in the process then complain about the results.'

# Nobody is above the Constitution

Once again, I feel it necessary to provide a Civics lesson to those among us that never had a Civics course and those who have forgotten the Civics lessons they did have. A good place to start is with the Oath of Office for the various elected and appointed members of our government.

\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter. So help me God.'

This oath does not mention the current President of the United States. He is not above the Constitution. Representatives and Senators did not swear an oath to him.

God is the only mention of higher authority in this oath. Paying any homage to anyone or anything else about the Constitution is a violation of this oath.

God above the Constitution. However, I do not believe any of the individuals who have taken these oaths are God, regardless of what they may think. No one is above the law and in our country that means no one is above the Constitution.

# Canadian call to arms

he trade war we are now fighting with the United States — a war we never wanted — is a momentous test for our

The cost of living, already at a crisis level for many, will rise. Canadian businesses, already struggling amid a weak economy, will be hurt. The dollar will fall. Jobs will be lost.

As we start to feel this pain, the temptation will be to point fingers at one another. The political reflex of the moment is to divide at every opportunity, to use any crisis as a wedge to separate not only one party from its rivals, but also its supporters from everyone else.

This is what Donald Trump wants. He wants us to believe his tariff threats are the inevitable consequence of our border policies, never mind the flow of fentanyl from our country is a trickle while the flow of guns from his is a flood.

He wants us to be distracted by our anger and distrust, to believe our standing in the world has been so weakened we have no choice but to accept his terms.

He wants us to blame ourselves and each other and acquiesce.

It's true we have failed to adjust our posture relative to our most important trading partner, even as it has become capricious and belligerent. We have failed to diversify our trading relationships despite the evident trouble on the horizon....

But he is dead wrong if he thinks we have been weakened to the point where we no longer believe our sovereignty is real or worth protecting.

There's been much speculation about Trump's motives. Since the border excuse is obviously bogus, what's he actually after? If this is, as he claims, also about saving American jobs, it's a funny way of going about it.

Surely part of the actual reason is simply revenue, particularly to offset the costs of the tax cuts he has promised to impose. But key, too, is what he might call the art of the deal.

He appears to be after leverage, not just for renego-He argued the U.S. was its rightful owner, tiating CUSMA, but also to pursue whatever his regime determines is in his country's (or his regime's) interests. In other words, he's trying to bully us — and how we and other like-minded, similarly threatened countries respond will shape the direction of the world in the years to come.

Power has always mattered. But Trump represents power unconstrained by legal or moral guardrails. He believes there is no

place for a country such as ours, a middle power that has often been a leader and beneficiary of the rules-based liberal international order, wielding our soft power to change the world, or at least nudge it in a better direction. He sees no value in the peace and order our constitution guarantees.


Now the question is whether our commitment to these values and to our shared citizenship eclipses the differences we have become so focused on.

In the days since Trump confirmed his tariffs, we have seen glimmers of hope, an outpouring of something like patriotism, a decidedly un-Canadian sentiment....

These Canadians understand what all of us must now grasp: No one has ever won by appeasing a bully. No one has ever won by negotiating with a knife to their throat.

But again and again, battles have been won by those who were counted out, who had no right to survive, never mind thrive, but did because they found strength in each other and a shared commitment to ideals and together did the hard work necessary to overcome.

# Chevrolet SSR is a retro wonder

his week, we're going to take a closer look at the 2004 to 2006 Chevrolet SSR (Super Sport Roadster), and its unique blend of retro charm and modern engineering. We'll also look at a very rare Brickyard 400 SSR pace car. It's one of just two produced, and it's owned by reader "Wild Bill" Knowles of Dalton,

Massachusetts. Bill and I met at the 2018 SSR Finger Lakes Run, promoted by SSR Owners Dave and Laurel Mareck. We did a feature years ago on Dave's 2006 SSR, which can easily be tracked down doing a Google

First, let's look at the SSR and its short run before GM pulled the plug.

Produced from model years 2003-2006, the SSR was a bold endeavor by Chevrolet to revive the spirit of the classic American pickup while instilling it with the flair of a convertible sports

#### **Design, inspiration**

The SSR's design drew inspiration from Chevrolet's late-1940s Advance Design trucks, particularly the 1947-1955 pickups.

Its retro-styled retractable hardtop, designed by Karmann and built by ASC, gave it a distinctive look that stands out on the highway.

#### Performance, power

Under the hood, the SSR initially featured a 5.3L V8 engine, producing 300 horsepower. This engine provided a lackluster 0-60 mph time of 7.7 seconds, and a quartermile time of 15.9 seconds at 86.4 mph.

In 2005, the SSR received a significant engine advancement with the 6.0L LS2 V8 engine, also found in the C6 Corvette, Trailblazer SS and Pontiac GTO. This engine pushed the SSR's horsepower to 390, and included a Tremec T56 six-speed manual transmission option for the first time. The performance improved considerably, with the manual version achieving a 0-60 mph time of 5.29 seconds

#### Reception, legacy

Despite its impressive design and performance, the SSR struggled in the market.

Chevrolet sold fewer than 9,000 units over its three-year production run. It cited a 301-day supply of SSRs and announced layoffs at the Lansing Craft Center, the factory that made the SSR. The SSR's high price tag of around \$42,000 also contributed to its limited sales.

SSR's legacy, however, remains strong among enthusiasts who welcome its unique blend of retro design and modern performance. Its rarity and distinctive design have made it a sought-after collector's item, with many fans still nostalgic for the

bold experiment that was the Chevrolet SSR.

#### 'Wild Bill's Brickyard 400 Pace truck SSR

Back in 2004, two black SSRs were removed from the late-2004 assembly line in Lansing, Michigan, to create two pace trucks for the 2005 Brickvard 400 NAS-CAR race. Both trucks were basic convertible roadster pickups. Marketing decided to make these trucks into show pieces for the 2006 SSR line.

These pace trucks included all-factory options including carpeted bed with faux wood strips and cargo light, a chrome package (inside and out), center console gauge package and an eight-speaker Bose stereo with six-disk, indash changer.

A generous budget was set aside for the "Brickvard" project. It was rumored GM budgeted up to \$200,000 for the trucks, with \$50,000 just in engine upgrade work.

Cosmetically, there is no wrap on these trucks. Each is painted the old-fashioned way at "Wheel to Wheel Customs" for paint work. Chevrolet introduced two-tone options for the SSR line at this race, with 45 Black over Silver SSRs used as parade vehicles on race day. Each of the trucks carried a NASCAR driver during the parade laps before the speedy spectacle.

The actual SSR pace trucks were to be a unique two-tone color combination that would represent the blue-and-orange color scheme for the 2005 Brickvard race.

GM worked with DuPont to orchestrate the perfect shade and layout. The scheme featured DuPont Hot Hues colors of True Blue on hood, roof and cargo area cover, with Molten Orange over Cosmic Dust base on lower body. Wide Bombay Blue and Tango transitional stripes were painted throughout the car to separate the blue and orange.

#### Pace car strobe details

Indy SSRs were fitted with 20 strobe lights: two in the high beam sockets, two in the fog light sockets, one built into each B-pillar, six built into the back of the roof, six



built into the tail gate and one each in the back-up light socket.

There is a large fire extinguisher mounted on the floor at the base of the passenger seat with Simpson racing lap belts installed. Graphics representing the race date, Allstate, Indy track, Nextel and NASCAR emblems make the SSR very special.

#### **Body modifications**

The rear NASCAR-style spoiler was custom made for the two Brickyard pace vehicles only. They were needed to take the Indy semi flat corners at a minimum of 100 mph during race day.

The front spoiler/splitter was custom made for a reported six SSRs.

The custom side-body molding fills the gap between the front and rear fenders. It is assumed there are six

SSRs with the original GM installed side moldings. The design was later sold to an aftermarket company.

#### Wheels

The HRE-647R are "True two-piece" rims. Custom made in 1998 for SSR Prototypes, 10 total sets were commissioned.

The first set consists of two rear 20"-diameter deep dish and two front 19"-diameter offset.

#### Mechanical

Knowles' SSR is refitted with a "blueprinted" LS2 6.0L V8 with an enhanced chip and cam improvement. The rev limiter was lifted, which gave the vehicle a boost in horsepower. Knowles noted there are only four 2004 SSRs with a 6.0L engine.


"I gave Indy a stretch one day," said Knowles. "Let's just say she is built for speed."

# Soaring prices hatch interest in backyard chickens

NEW YORK — Thinking about backyard chickens as egg prices soar? Think hard, especially in light of the bird flu outbreak.

Keeping home chickens as a pastime has continued to grow since the pandemic. But if eggs are the goal, remember it takes planning and investment to raise the chickens and protect against bird flu. Costs might go well beyond the nationwide average of \$4.15 a dozen that commercial eggs sold for in December.

"Anyone who's done an ounce of research will very quickly understand that there are no free eggs, there are no inexpensive eggs in keeping chickens," said Kathy Shea Mormino. She's a home chicken blogger and author who has about 50 of the birds at her Suffield, Connecti-

"You're going to pay more, particularly in your first several years, in your set up and in your birds. And there's a huge learning curve on how to care for animals that are really unusual pets," said Mormino. She's kept chickens for 15 years and calls herself the Chicken Chick.

Costs vary wildly, from about \$200 to \$2,000 for a coop alone. Feeders and waterers range from about \$8 to \$50 or more, depending on the size and type.

Bird flu has forced farmers to slaughter millions of chickens a month, contributing (along with inflation) to the steep price of commercial eggs and resulting in some scantily stocked stores around the country. The scarcity and high prices are causing some to look for a backyard alternative.

"We've seen a real uptick in calls recently from people wanting to start their own backyard flocks. With the egg shortages at grocery stores, many are excited about the idea of raising chickens and taking steps toward sustainability," said Matthew Aversa, a co-owner of Winding Branch Ranch. It's a nonprofit sanctuary and farm animal rescue outside San Antonio.

"We adopt out whole flocks. We're receiving at least a dozen inquiries per week," he said.

Kate Perz, the animal science coordinator for Cornell Cooperative Extension of Suffolk County, New York said unlike other pandemic pastimes, raising home chickens has

"It's not always cost-effective," she said. "You have to really look at how many eggs you're eating and what the cost of those are versus what you would be spending.

There are other reasons, of course, to keep chickens at home, not the least of which is the sheer joy of their presence. Mormino and other "chickeneers," as she calls home enthusiasts, have a coop full of tips on how to get started.

#### **Tend to legal matters**

Mormino, who wrote "The Chicken Chick's Guide to Backyard Chickens," said the first thing to consider is whether chickens are right for you. After that, don't assume your county, town or city will allow it.

Look up zoning and building codes yourself if you feel capable. Otherwise, consult an attorney who specializes in municipal law in your

Don't rely on word of mouth or even a town worker to know the ins and outs. Is a building permit required to build a coop? Are roosters banned under noise ordinances? Sometimes, zoning codes are silent on the subject. Don't assume that's a green light. Many codes are "permissive use" regulations, Mormino said, essentially meaning if the code doesn't say you're permitted, you're not!

If chicken-keeping is allowed, is there a limit on how many birds? Are there restrictions on where a coop can be built in relation to neighboring property lines. Most homeowners associations have rules on animal

Mormino had a neighbor who kept three horses and a small flock of chickens, so she assumed they were legal. They weren't. She called the town clerk's office to ask whether a building permit was required to build a coop and was told it wasn't. It was.

She successfully defended a lawsuit against her (she's an attorney) and prevailed in a long battle to amend the law, legalizing backyard chickens in her farming town.

#### What about bird flu?

birds live where wildlife live," Mormino explained. "People need to know if they have a bird or birds that chickeneers make is to bring new die suddenly from some of the symptoms, they need to contact the USDA lived someplace else. That's the fastto get the postmortem exam and the birds tested for bird flu."

Don't bring sick birds into the house for care. That raises the risk of transmission to humans. Once the virus is confirmed, the entire flock needs to be euthanized, she and Perz said.

Symptoms of bird flu include: sudden death without any clinical signs; swelling of the head, eyelids, comb, wattles or hocks; diarrhea; stumbling or falling down; decreased Bird flu is highly contagious. It egg production and/or soft-shelled spreads mostly by migrating water- or misshapen eggs; and coughing

Don't feed any wildlife in areas where your chickens dwell or roam. Wash hands thoroughly after tending to chickens and dedicate a pair of things that we can do because our shoes or boots strictly for use around

'The biggest mistake backyard chickens into their flock that have est way to bring disease into your chicken yard," Mormino said.

#### **Consider your costs**

Sarah Penny has turned her 7,000-square-foot home lot in Knoxville. Tennessee, into a beautiful garden and chicken home. She has nine at about \$60, saving a bit by also feedbirds and grows more than half the food she and her 13-year-old son eat.

She's had chickens since 2021 and estimates her startup costs at about

Monthly costs vary based on what chickens are fed and how coops are kept. Penny, for instance, uses the deep litter method and composts from her coop, meaning she's not mucking out her coop more than twice a year.

'But the cost of starting with fast.'

backyard chickens is definitely quite expensive. I don't know if a lot of people know that," Penny said.

Her coop alone, which her family built, cost about \$2,000. It had to be outfitted to keep predators out, including rats that tunnel under the ground.

Many people start with buying hatchlings, which just got more expensive to ship via the U.S. Postal Service due to new fees. Raising hatchlings requires a chick brooder involving a separate enclosure, heat lamp, feeders and other supplies.

Penny buys a bag of feed every two weeks for \$15 to \$20 a bag. There's also the cost of calcium, such as oyster shells, and grit to aid digestion if chickens are not free-ranging or getting those elements in their feed.

She estimates her monthly costs ing her chickens healthy human leftovers. She's careful not to include foods toxic for chickens, including onions, potatoes and avocados.

It's all worth it to Penny. "We eat a lot of eggs," she said.

#### Ex-New Zealand Prime Minister writes memoir

NEW YORK (AP) — Two years after her shocking decision to resign as prime minister of New Zealand, Jacinda Ardern is to publish a memoir.

Crown a division of Penguin Random House, announced Ardern's "A Different Kind of Power" is scheduled for June 3.

Only 37 when elected in 2017, Ardern was widely praised for her compassionate response to the 2019 terrorist attacks against two mosques in Christchurch and for her initial handing of the coronavirus pandemic.

By early 2023, the coronavirus was spreading, and resistance was growing to her zerotolerance policy of mandates

helped keep the pandemic out of New Zealand. With her popularity fading, Ardern stunned many supporters by deciding to leave saving she no longer had "enough in the tank."
